

Fatal Accident.

On Saturday afternoon a very distressing accident occurred at the Gren-fell Hospital. Frederick Hillier, a naive of Sydney, New South Wales, who had earlier been discharged from the Institute as fully recovered from the "flu" returned on Saturday complaining of a pain in his side. Dr. Camp-tell advised the man to rest there for 3 or 4 days. Later in the evening Dr Fraser visited the Institute, and as he was going to the Girls' Department, Hillier offered to take him up in the lift. Hastening to the elevator opened the door and stepped in, not noticing that the car had gone up consequently he fell to the bettom of the shaft, a distance of 15 feet. Other members of the staff hearing of the accident hurried to the ground door and found Hillier unconscious, his skull having been fractured by the til death released him at 1245 a.m. yesterday.
