Wedding Bells.

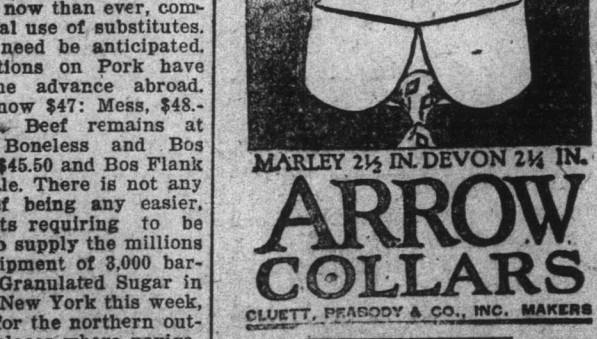

Steamers in Port.

Two steamers put in port yesterday morning to undergo some slight repairs. The s.s. Canadian, bound to England with a cargo of grain, put in to have her boilers attended to, and the War-Mohawk, which had some engine trouble to be fixed. The War-Mohawk is the largest wooden steamer that ever entered the harbor; being one of the fleet built in Canada to relieve the tonnage shortage during the war. She is bound across with a cargo of iron ore and lumber.

The Epidemic.

Two patients were discharged from the Grenfell Hall Hospital yesterday. Mrs. Fleet and her son; and two others left to-day. Wm. Foad, St. Lawrence, one of the Meigie's crew, was admitted Saturday. Two young women, Misses Hickey and Harrison, of Brazil's and Allan's Squares, were taken in yesterday; also some of the crew of the S. S. Drummond. On Saturday 35 cases were reported between Long Pond and Upper Gullies and 5 at Heart's Content. Dr. Fraser received 11 words yesterday from Dr. Mosley, of Burnt that 350 cases had developed there and the disease was so prevalent he could not combat it without assistance. Dr. Gill, of Brigus, reported 7 cases in one house at Turk's Gut, besides scattered cases. Mr. J. S. Currie, M. H. A., had a message yesterday from Flat Islands, that many persons were dying there, and medical assistance was needed. Arrangements have been made for a doctor to proceed there.

Impressive Ceremony.

In the presence of a large congregation in Gower St. Church last evening, an Honor Roll containing the names of 118 members of the congregation who had served in the war, was unveiled by Mr. J. E. P. Peters. This Honor Roll, which was designed by Mr. W. G. Currie, will hang in the entrance hall of the Church. Rev. E. W. Forbes, Esq., acted as officiating minister, and read appropriate addresses, after which the impressive ceremony came to a close.

Fraternal Sympathy.

Obituary.

ROBERT MARSHALL. His many friends, among whom was every member of the C.L.B., will learn with deep regret of the passing of Robert S. Marshall, son of the late Robert G. Marshall, Long's Hill, which occurred at Piley's Island yesterday. Deceased had been engaged there as cooper for the past three months, and pneumonia following influenza terminated a life well worthy of emulation. He was a life-long member of the C. L. B., being a Sergeant in A. Co., and no better or more enthusiastic sportsman than he lived here in running and wrestling few equalled him, and his many prizes won in these sports testify to this. He is survived by a widow, mother, four sisters and two brothers, Capt. Fred of the Regiment, and the Rev. R. N. Co., to whom the sympathy of the community is proffered.

Fatal Accident.

On Saturday afternoon a very distressing accident occurred at the Grenfell Hospital. Frederick Hillier, a native of Woodville, and worked at earlier times discharged from the Institute as fully recovered from the "flu" returned on Saturday complaining of a pain in his side. Dr. Campbell advised the man to rest for 3 or 4 days. Later in the evening Dr. Fraser visited Hillier, and worked him going to the Girls' Department, Hillier offered to take him up in the lift, and as he was about to do so, he opened the door and stepped in, not noticing that the car had gone up, consequently he fell to the bottom of the shaft a distance of 15 feet. Other members of the staff hearing of the accident hurried to the ground floor, and found Hillier unconscious, his skull having been fractured by the fall. He lived in a comatose state until his death, which occurred at 12:45 yesterday. Everything possible was done for the unfortunate man by the Manager of the Institute and by the nurses as well as by Drs. Fraser and Campbell and the Rev. Dr. Carter who was also summoned. Deceased was 36 years of age and was formerly employed as fireman on board the S. S. Discovery. He was of a very obliging disposition, and during his stay at the hospital had made himself generally liked by all for his willingness to help. He had often acted as elevator operator. Mr. Jones called to see his relatives, and in the meantime Mr. J. Connolly is looking after the undertaking arrangements.
