



**Regatta Meeting—
 Crews Enter.**

The Regatta Committee met last night, President Hiscock presiding. Present were Vice-President W. J. Higgins, Secretary J. L. Noonan, Treasurer J. L. Slattery, F. W. Hayward, L. G. Chafe, C. W. After the minutes of the previous meetings were confirmed, motion was made to amend the rule dealing with the amateur race. One section of the existing rule prevented rowers who had participated in races for money prizes after 1900, taking part. This was considered a hardship in view of the fact that the Committee was responsible for the prizes and not the rowers. It was also held that our regatta are solely amateur, though money prizes have been offered. The rule was amended to allow any person not occupied at manual labor for two years previous to the regatta to qualify.

The collectors handed in all outstanding amounts, and the Treasurer hopes that there is a sufficiency of funds to conduct the programme successfully.

A motion was made to have the order of the programme changed in order that His Royal Highness would have the opportunity of seeing the fishermen row, their race to be moved from 7th to 2nd or 3rd. Objections to this change was made by the Press representatives and Football representatives, who were attracted, and the motion was withdrawn.

The President informed the meeting that His Royal Highness would arrive at the Lake side about 10.20 and would be met by the Committee, whose guest he would be up to noon. It is hoped that the Prince will be able to witness at least three races, if not four, and the events will start on time.

Objection was raised to two entries for the football race. One was considered eligible, and the second will not be allowed to row.

On motion of Mr. F. W. Hayward, the Committee will forward a telegram of thanks to King George on Regatta Day, acknowledging the distinguished presence of the Prince of Wales on the green.
