The Storm's Damage.

Owing to the dislocation of the telegraph lines no news from North of St. John's has been received since the storm started Friday night last. From points around Conception Bay, however, news of destruction wrought by the sea is coming in. The following message was received by the Deputy Minister of Customs from the sub-collector at Old Perlican.

"Terrible storm, and highest sea in history of oldest inhabitants, raged all night at Old Perlican. Greater part of waterside property destroyed, public road, wharf, stages, stores, motor boats, small boats and other property. Estimated loss \$20,000."

From the sub-collector at Holyrood:—
"Picked up small motor boat, painted red, white, streak of blue top side, black inside, five horse power Acadia engine. Apparently new boat. Little wrecked. Engine O.K."

Mr. Jesse Whiteway received the following message from Mr. J. J. Snelgrove of Grates Cove:—

"Through last night's gale grates Cove has met the heaviest loss ever known by the oldest inhabitant. The waterside was completely swept and damage is estimated at over \$100,000."

The Inspector General had the following message from Sgt. March, Old Perlican:—

"Public wharf and road with stores, stages, flasks and motor boats destroyed last night with wind and sea. The whole fishery outfit damaged. Cannot estimate loss. The like never known."

The wires are working to the westward and to-day the Minister of Public Works received a message from Bonne Bay in reference to some road work but there was no mention made of any destruction by the storm.

Repairing the Roadbed.

RAILWAY OPERATIONS WILL BE RESUMED FRIDAY.

In all probability railway operations which have been suspended since Saturday last, owing to the disastrous effects of the big storm, will be resumed on Friday. The line will be completely repaired to as far east as Holyrood by nightfall, as work has been going on in this section for some time. It was not until to-day that men could be set to work repairing the roadbed between Foxtrap and Holyrood. It is on this part of the line that the greatest damage was done, and the heavy seas which have been raging along the beaches there are only now abating. In many places it is possible to walk under the rails, so great was the destruction to the roadbed, whilst in some cases rails and all were destroyed by the tremendous waves. Work is being rushed and hopes are entertained that by Thursday night repairs will have been completed.

TRAIN MOVEMENTS.

The Carbonara local was able to proceed as far as Briggs Junction this morning, and brought passengers and mails to connect with the Placentia train and the West bound express which was to leave North Arm Bridge at 1 p.m. Motor cars and a truck left town early this morning, carrying letter mail only, and provisions for the express. Owing to the bad condition of the road the truck had to remain at Kelligrews, and the cars made several trips to North Arm Bridge, bringing along the mails and provisions. The passengers on the express are returning in these cars and the letter mail will also be sent along. Several special trains are now on various parts of the line working on the washouts.

BOOSTING THE TARIFF.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.
Representatives from agricultural districts here and agreed to try to introduce the Fordney tariff Bill some day on agricultural products, slighter than emergency tariff rates.

OTTAWA, Nov. 1.

DIVERSITY OF OPINION.
BELFAST, Nov. 1.
Commenting on Lloyd George's speech the Northern Whig says "it is unlikely that the Premier's proposal will precipitate a crisis in the Conference, for rebel delegates credited with a desire that the war, which some believe inevitable, come over the question of the Union of Ireland." The Irish News says the British Government will look on the debate to proclaim the moral and destructive principle of the war, and adds, "it is hard to see what can be done to make Ireland conceivable the partition holds."

STER MAY HAVE LAST WORD.
LONDON, Nov. 1.
Sinn Fein headquarters the view that the Premier's address had nothing to precipitate a crisis, as contained only statements with which Sinn Fein was familiar. The correspondent suggests that an attempt is prepared to bring pressure to reach an accommodation with Southern Ireland. Ulster is regarded by the English press as a difficult, and the result of suspension of negotiations to-day is being with absorbing interest. Mr. George and Lord Birkenhead were in the morning.

HARVEY'S TRIBUTE.
NEWYORK, Oct. 31.
George Harvey, United States Ambassador, speaking to-night at a dinner given by the Pilgrims Society to delegates to the Washington Conference as "an ordeal not of battle of faith," the underlying part of which was not more a challenge to the League of Nations than it was to the Monroe Doctrine. Ambassador Harvey opened his address by referring to the circumstances in which the Washington Conference was accepted by the British Empire, or would I forget that on Sunday afternoon in July, 1914, Mr. Lloyd George seated in the dining room of the Hotel de Ville, summoned a Conference of the British Empire, and asking if such a thing would be done in a flash Premier was asked, "We accept, he almost shouted, 'I accept gladly, we accept gratefully, we do not need to read the telegram, it is all right; we will do every-

POLLUTING THE OCEAN.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.
A resolution authorizing and requesting the President to call an International Conference to consider the constantly increasing pollution of navigable streams from the dumping of oil refuse by steamships, was introduced to-day by representative Appleby, Republican, New Jersey. The casting of oil refuse into the sea near the shore line, the resolution set forth, has created "a serious menace likely to result in fires and destruction of ocean fisheries."

AUTHORITY TO PROCEED.
LONDON, Oct. 31.
The Government obtained, as expected a mandate from the House of Commons to-night to proceed with Irish negotiations, when a Unionist motion censuring the Government for initiating Irish negotiations was voted down by 439 to 43.

FOR BENEFIT OF CREDITORS.
NEW YORK, Oct. 31.
Ulster paper mills, Inc. with offices here and a plant in Ulster County, New York, assigned to-day for the benefit of creditors.

TEN PER CENT CUT.
SYDNEY, N.S., Oct. 31.
A wage reduction of ten per cent, affecting all employees of the local Steel plant, and officials of the British Empire Steel Corporation, was announced to-day, effective Nov. first.

Bornholm Met Rough Weather.

S.S. Bornholm, Captain Hansen, arrived in port this morning with a coal cargo from North Sydney. The ship left on Friday last at 9 o'clock, and at that time there was a strong North wind blowing. On reaching the coast the ship hugged the shore and sheltered under Cape Race last night. A hurricane wind was experienced all the way down the coast, with a very heavy sea. The strong back of No. 2 hatch broke loose but the hatches were fortunately secured. The deck house aft was also smashed but otherwise the ship came through all right. The captain said he saw no sign of any schooners when coming along, except two very small boats at anchor under Cape St. Mary's.

Digby in Port.

S.S. Digby, Capt. F. W. Chambers, D.S.C., arrived in port this morning at 10.30 o'clock. When the ship left Halifax on Saturday at 8 p.m. there was a heavy sea on with a North wind. After passing St. Pierre the ship encountered a N.W. wind with a heavy sea. At 2 a.m. this morning the Digby passed Cape Race. The captain reports that icebergs are about and several were reported to him in latitude 46.50 N; longitude 46.53 W.
