TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

NAVAL REDUCTION.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. Severe criticism in certain leading British Liberal papers regarding reservations to Hughes naval reduction plan, which were proposed by the British delegation, is based on misconception of the actual attitude of the delegation, according to statements made by British representatives here. The plan of keeping one small naval building yard in operation in each country, during the naval holiday, was, it was said, necessary, in order to keep ships in repair, and perhaps to replace ships lost by accident.

ULSTER LOYALISTS HOLD MASS MEETING

BELFAST, Nov. 16. Ten thousand Loyalists, in three meetings to-night, emphatically protested against the British Cabinet's treatment of Ulster and great enthusiasm was displayed. The Lord Mayor of Belfast, presiding over the principal meeting, declared Ulster would never he the vassal of a Sinn Fein Parliament. The mention of Lloyd George's name was greeted with groans. A resolution was adopted endorsing the action of Sir James Craig and colleagues in the peace negotiations.

NUMBER OF UNEMPLOYED IN-CREASING.

TORONTO, Nov. 16. Although labor conditions just now are slightly better than last year, Captain Meath. Superintendent of the Employment Officer here to-day, predicted the appearance of unemployment and distress, as serious as that of last winter, with the first cold snap. Those out of work here now number 10.000 and are increasing at the rate of one hundred per day.
