FIGHT AT PISTOL POINT.

When Forced Into Ring in U. S. With Injured Thumb.

Interviews after his amazing victory on Thursday night with Stripling (Colombus) (Georgia), McGuire, the boxer, declared, says Reuter, he was forced into the ring at the last moment after he had informed the promoters that he would be unable to fight owing to an injury to his thumb.

A large body of ticket holders had gathered at McGuire's training quarters and shouted threats to him when the police intervened.

The fight went the full ten rounds. McGuire, the referee, Mr. Harry Erie, states that he was obliged, under intimidation by the 7,000 people present, to give a verdict for Stripling. After the spectators had disappeared, however, he announced that his final and final verdict was that the fight was a draw.

McGuire declares that he is willing to fight Stripling again, but not in St. John's.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.
A violent easterly gale swept down on the Aquinama as she was passing Nantuxet. Light last night, and caused the vessel to lurch sharply upsetting the saloon passengers gathered in the lounge and causing injuries to fourteen. Capt. Sir James Charles said it was the worst storm he had seen in thirty-three years at sea.

MY OWN TO REPLACE REV. NEW YORK, Oct. 24.

Admiral Grayson's "My Own" has been substituted for "Zev" whose race with Papyrus, English Derby winner, is fourth event on the racing card at Belmont Park to-morrow afternoon. This was announced to-day but lacks complete confirmation, Zev's retirement being due to an attack of skin disease that has taken the form of an epidemic, having invaded several barns at Belmont Park in the past two days. Every effort is being made to keep the disease away from Papyrus' stable. The odds in favor of Papyrus are climbing after to-day's burst of speed by the Derby winner, and in view of the uncertainty of his opponent in the international event, "My Own" left Laurel, Maryland, this morning in special train for Belmont Park. In England the book makers are giving two to one against Papyrus and there is little interest being exhibited by the general public in the international event, while racing fans are eagerly consuming all literature and odds on local races.

NORTH EAST GALE ON ATLANTIC COAST.
NEW YORK, Oct. 24.

A fifty mile northeast reported to be riding along the coast from Newfoundland to Cape Hatteras hit this section hard yesterday endangering seagull craft and leading indirectly to the injury of more than a score of persons. A three masted schooner called for help thirty miles off Fire Island and the coastguard cutter Seminoles was rushing to her aid. The gale swept across Long Island, caught forty-five foot ketch Harpoon owned by William Washburne Nutting which was to have raced boat of equal size belonging to Duke Leicester across Atlantic next spring, and cast it on the rocks off Port Totten near White-stone, Long Island. Despatches from Norfolk tell of S.O.S. call from British steamer Westmoreland and stated that Cape Charles Lightship had been blown from her moorings. Slippery rails led to the injury of six persons in a rear end trolley collision at Clifton, New Jersey, while Peter Ketchum, of Minola, a motorman was badly burned and shocked when he grasped a live wire that had fallen across the path of his car in Garden City. The storm continued into the night tearing through all parts of Greater New York. It is the worst storm seen in years in Coney Island. Fifteen persons were injured in auto and street car accidents. At City Island the northeastern hurled up waves thirty feet high. Hardly a pleasure boat was not dragged from its moorings. Wrecks of at least fifty motor boats and small yachts lined the windward shores to-night.

BRITISH SAILOR KNIFE BY AN AMERICAN.
ANTWERP, Oct. 24.
One British sailor was killed by a knife thrust through his heart in a clash between the sailors of the United States cruiser Pittsburgh and the crew of the British merchant steamer Melita.

REPUBLICAN WOMEN KEEP VIGIL OUTSIDE MOUNT JOY PRISON.
DUBLIN, Oct. 24.
A band of Republican women kept vigil and recited the "Rosary" throughout the night outside Mount Joy prison where four hundred Republican prisoners are continuing their hunger strike. It is reported that sixty have been released unconditionally and the remainder are in a weakened condition.

GASOLINE REDUCED IN PRICE TO 12 CENTS.
