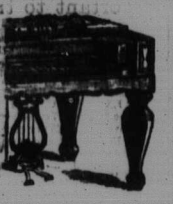

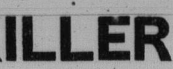

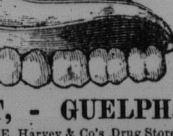

BRIDGES LET.—On Saturday last, say
the Elora Observer, the commissioners a
pointed to manage the County Roads
this locality met to receive tenders fo
the construction of the bridges whic
were to be let on that day. Several of
fers were received, but those for th
bridge over the creek immediately nort
of Ewing's tavern, between Elora an
Alma were all considered too high, an
the work was allowed to stand over. Th
bridge at Hirst's hollow is to be raise
for a nine feet opening, sixteen feet i
width, with eight feet wings all of ston
with timber and plank covering, was le
to Mr. McIntosh for \$220. The bridge
Felix McGinn's will have abutment
thirty-two feet long, with six feet wings
and the wall's six feet high, all of ston
and covered with timber and plank
which the same contractor tendered fo
at \$115. The committee were under th
impression that the pri were too
high, but the other tenders were at
much higher figure.

SURVEY OF THE NORTH WEST.—The
Globe is happy to learn that Mr. Stoug
ton Dennis has been employed by th
Dominion Government to make arrange
ments for the first survey of lands in th
North-West Territory. He is to repor
on the best method of survey, choosi
between our own of concessions and lots
and the American, of section and quarter
section. He will examine the Americ
system in Minnesota on his way to th
Territory, and will almost certainly adop
it. Practical surveyors invariably prefer
it, and it has been employed in the recent
surveys in Algoma. Mr. Dennis will
make his headquarters at Fort Garry;
select, after enquiries, the first place for
settlement; settle on his meridional end
base lines, and lay out at once enough
land for the occupation of the emigrants
of next season. Mr. Dennis has had long
experience in Canada, and is well qua
lified for the work which he has under
taken.

DROWNED IN A WELL.—A young man
named George Chandler was drowned in
a well, in Toronto, on Sunday morning.
He went to draw a bucket of water, an
being subject to epileptic fits, took one
of them at the well and fell in—a di
stance of fifteen feet. His skull was fr
actured in falling, so that it is believed h
must have been almost dead before he
reached the bottom.
