The Charitable, Benevolent and Educational Institutions of Canada.
Mr. S. Drapeau, of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, has sent us the prospectus of a work which he is now engaged in preparing, entitled a "Description, History and Statistics of the Charitable, Benevolent and Educational Institutions of Canada," which will be illustrated with numerous engravings, including portraits of historical and distinguished persons; views and plans of buildings; maps and descriptive tables; seals and armorial bearings, &c. The object of the work is to supply the Canadian public with a full and complete historical, descriptive and statistical account of the many noble institutions of benevolence and charity which exist in the Dominion. It will be published in five volumes, the 1st being devoted to Hospitals and Lazarettos, the 2nd to Asylums and Alms Houses, the 3rd to Orphanages, the 4th to Institutions for Gratuitous Education, and the 5th to Miscellaneous Societies. The first volume will appear early in 1873. The subscription price will be \$1 per volume in paper cover; \$2 50 per vol., in cloth and illustrated. The selling price to non-subscribers will be double these figures. The author has undertaken no light task, and if the result fulfils the expectations and promises of the prospectus, the work will be a most valuable and interesting one.

More is moving in the matter of the Guelph Valley Railway. The city Council on Monday night agreed to submit a by-law for confirmation, by the ratepayers, granting a bonus of \$100,000 to the road.
