**The Champion English Racquet Player Gets a \$10,000 Stake.**

**McLaurin Wins the Canadian Checker Championship.**

**Baseball Player Fatally Hurt - F. O. Meyers of Kingston, Ont. Breaks a World's Cycling Record.**

### LAOROSSE.

**BECOMING A COLLEGE GAME.** Lacrosse is becoming popular among collegians, and it is expected that a new intercollegiate league will soon be formed to put this branch of sport on an equal footing with other pastimes. Columbia is getting candidates together for a team. Harvard, Cornell, Stevens, Johns Hopkins, Lehigh and the colleges of the city of New York already have teams. Yale and Pennsylvania are also organizing teams.

**McLaurin Becomes Champion By Default.**

The championship checker contest between James Dykes, of Windsor, Ont., and James McLaurin, of Toronto, was decided on Saturday in McLaurin's favor. The match was awarded to McLaurin because many of those interested in the contest are disappointed. It was decided in signing the agreement that the games should commence at 2 p.m. each day. On Saturday Dykes did not put in an appearance at the hall at that time. McLaurin waited for some time, and then claimed the match by default. D. H. Bedford, who was acting as referee, decided that McLaurin should be awarded the championship.

A number of checker enthusiasts stated after the match had been decided that it was a very unsatisfactory way to settle the matter, and that they would prefer that the match had been completed. Dykes was interviewed after the match had been decided, and he was very despondent over the result. He said that McLaurin had the match won, and should have played the games out. He would have been satisfied to surrender the championship to McLaurin if he had played all the games, as he had held it for eighteen years, and he was willing to allow McLaurin to be his successor. He was deeply affected by the outcome, and almost wept when he realized that he no longer was champion of Canada. He said that he was immediately going to Montreal to play a man from Nova Scotia, and if he won, would then challenge McLaurin to a match for a big side bet, and would at once post a forfeit. The Windsor club is not satisfied with the outcome, and McLaurin is off with it.

**RACQUET.** WON \$10,000.

Peter Latham, the champion racquet player of England, beat George Standing at the Racquet and Tennis Club in New York on Saturday by a score of 4 games to 3, and thus won the match and the stake of \$10,000.

### THE TURF.

**RACING IN ENGLAND.** London, Nov. 28.—At Saturday's racing of the Manchester November meeting Mr. J. B. Leigh's 3-year-old bay colt Manxman, ridden by Ted Sloane, won the Farewell weight handicap plate of 4,000 sovereigns. Sloane, riding Mr. D. Cooper's 2-year-old chestnut colt Le Javelot, finished first for the Syndicate plate of 100 sovereigns.

Marther IV, with Ted Sloane up, won the Saturday welter handicap plate of 100 sovereigns.

The November handicap was won by Sir H. Farquhar's 3-year-old filly Asteria, and the Lordard-Beresford stable's 5-year-old chestnut horse Keenan, ridden by Sloane, was second. This race is of 1,500 sovereigns, for 3-year-olds and upwards.

Mr. Alexander's brown colt Ravelaw Castle, ridden by Ted Sloane, won the final plate.

### WHEEL.

**MYERS IS ROAD KING.**

Kingston, Ont., Nov. 28.—F. O. Meyers, the Canadian road racing champion, has broken a world's record. On Friday he covered 50 miles, from Belleville to Kingston in 2:07 hours, at a 24-mile per hour clip. His record was held by L. C. Wahl, Colonial Springs, Cal., at 2:15 hours. Meyers' record reads: Fifty miles in 2:07 hours; 100 miles in 4:15 hours.

Samuel B. McKee, of Washington township, Indiana, county, Pennsylvania, died on Saturday from the result of injuries received a week previous in a baseball game at Crofton. He ran from first to second base and collided with the baseman. The above report comes from Pittsburgh. The Texas League salary limit for 1898 will be \$800.

Pitcher Lewis, of the Boston club, is going to follow in Billy Sunday's steps and become an evangelist.

Tony Mullane, Fred Pfeffer and Bob Clark, all ex-players, will be found among the applicants for a place on the league umpire staff.

Arlie Latham has not been reserved by Mansfield, and is trying to get back into either the National League or one of the class A leagues as a first baseman, which position he played right up to the handle last season.

It is expected that at the next meeting of the National League, Dr. George H. Brown, of Port Huron, will be elected president, and Mr. Cal Davis, of Hamilton, secretary-treasurer. Charles Cushman, the old Toronto manager, is mentioned as a possibility on N. E. Young's staff of National League umpires. Cushman was one of the best umpires in the Western League this year.

At New York, on Saturday night, Larry Becker, of Bayonne, N. J., and Jack Delaney, fought 15 rounds to a draw. Becker did most of the beating, and many thought he should have had the decision, but Delaney was strong in the last round, and showed good staying powers, which gained him a draw.

The Detroit Chamber of Commerce Building will be sold next Wednesday under the hammer, in default of payment of a first mortgage of \$400,000 and interest held by the New York Life Insurance Company. The structure is thirteen stories high, appraised by experts to be worth \$800,000.

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## A Furious Gale.

**Strews the Coast of England with Many Wrecks.**

**A Score of Bodies Washed Ashore and Many Vessels Believed to Have Gone Down with All on Board - All the Coast Towns Suffer.**

London, Nov. 28.—A heavy north-west gale with terrific hail squalls has done much damage at Holyhead and near Liverpool. Many yachts and small craft have been sunk at their moorings, and some buildings have been injured.

The gale, which swept the English coasts yesterday, doing much damage at Holyhead and other places, raged all night long and had not abated in fury this morning, when it amounted to almost a cyclone in many places, and was accompanied by snow and hail.

A long list of fatalities, wrecks, and damage to property has already been received. All the coast towns have suffered, and a score of bodies have been washed ashore. Falling walls and flying debris have added to the loss of life.

Vessels are reported ashore on every part of the coast, and many ships are known to have foundered with the probable loss of all hands. There is much wreckage about the Godwin Sands.

At Lowestoft, Yarmouth, and elsewhere the sea is high, and the waves are breaking over the sea walls and esplanades and doing other serious damage. The sea wall at Scarborough has been washed away, and the passengers and mail services across the channel have been for the most part suspended.

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### COMING LEGAL CHANGES.

**Report That Mr. Justice Robertson is Going Off the Bench.**

Toronto, Nov. 28.—It is said that Chief Justice Sir Thomas Wardlaw Taylor, formerly master-in-ordinary of the high court of justice at Toronto, and now chief justice of Manitoba, has decided to retire on account of ill health, and will be succeeded by Mr. Thomas Hodgins, Q.C., the present master-in-ordinary of the high court in Ontario. It is also reported that Mr. Justice Robertson is about to resign his office, and will be replaced by Mr. D. W. Wood.

### A MYSTERY SOLVED.

**Remains of a Missing Woman Discovered - Checked to Death by Her Husband.**

Chicago, Nov. 28.—The mystery surrounding the disappearance of Mrs. Pauline Merry from her home at No. 50 Hope street, was solved yesterday afternoon by the confession of Thomas Hickey, a notorious criminal, who had been in the habit of visiting her home. Hickey told a revolting story of how Christopher Merry choked and beat his wife a week ago last Friday, and then buried her beneath a few inches of loose dirt by the roadside.

The horrible story told by Hickey was corroborated by the discovery of the remains of the missing woman, which were found by a police officer while on duty near the roadside.

### Casualties.

**Farmer Stricken Down While Feeding the Cattle.**

**A Lady Drowned at Smith's Falls - Two Duck Hunters Lost Their Lives - Killed by a Snow-Slide.**

Walkerton, Nov. 28.—Patrick O'Brien arose the other morning, ate a hearty breakfast, and went out to feed the cattle and do the chores around the barn. While doing this he was seized with heart disease and dropped dead.

Nelson, B. C., Nov. 28.—Jos. McGibbon, a miner, employed on the Red Fox, was killed by a snowslide Saturday night. McGibbon was on his way from his cabin to the Red Fox tunnel, when he was caught by a small slide and was carried to the bottom of the lowest basin.

Florence, Ont., Nov. 28.—Mrs. Jos. Tully lost her life Saturday at Smith's Falls, seven miles from here. Mr. Henry Tully, in company with his sister-in-law, started to cross the river on a raft, which had been used for two years for carrying lumber. The high water the current was too swift, for safety, and Mr. Tully, when about half-way over, determined to return, when, in so doing, one of the posts in the raft gave way, and Mrs. Tully was thrown into the water. Mr. Tully plunged into the water after her, and made a desperate fight to save her, but the water was too cold and he barely escaped with his life. The body was found a quarter of a mile down the stream. Deceased was 32 years of age, and leaves two girls, 5 and 8 years old, respectively.

### HUNTERS DROWNED.

Kingston, Ont., Nov. 28.—On Wednesday, George Cole, postmaster, Big Island, and Wm. Morden, went out duck-shooting in Bag Bay, stating that they would return the same day, when they failed. Searching parties, went out, but failed to find any trace of them or their boat, until Saturday, when their hats and a pair of oars were found floating in the bay. Cole was a married man with two children. Morden was a young man and unmarried.

Toronto, Nov. 28.—Mrs. Hern, 43 years of age, committed suicide at the house of Deputy Reeve Stubbard, in Eglinton, five miles north of Toronto, Saturday. She was discovered by a Miss Brady, who, on rising, at 7 o'clock, left Mrs. Hern in bed. At 8 o'clock she returned to find her hanging from a beam by a strap around her neck. Mrs. Hern, who was separated from her husband, leaves one child.
