FIERCE AND FATAL FIRE.

Chicago City Railway Suffers Heavy Loss-554 Cars Burned-Three Lives Lost.

Chicago, July 18 .- The car barns of

the Chicago City Railway Company on Cottage Grove avenue, near Thirtyminth street, were destroyed by fire Saturday night. The barns were 150 feet long, 400 feet deep and occupied Three-fourths of a square, and were filled with long cars, being the stable for the entire system. The company lost 554 cars, 160 of them being grip cars. Not a thing in the building was saved. The loss is estimated at fully \$500,000, the building and con- niture and stoves of every description. tents being insured for \$311,000. The rapidity and the firemen experienced Telephone 997. great difficulty in preserving many of the adjoining buildings. They managed, however, to confine the fire to the car barns. Pipeman Samuel Sullivan was badly hurt by a portion of the House of Lords. the front wall when it toppled over, but his injuries will not prove fatal.

A fire engine was smashed by the same wall. It is thought the fire originated from the crossing of two electric light wires. Of thirty horses in the barn, Sixteen were saved, and fourteen were burned in their stalls.
