The Grain Fields.

They are also easily hurt by frost, gand on that account must mature early. Phosphates are, in the majority of cases, the best fertilizer, one form of which is bone dust. This may be applied at the rate of 500 to 700 pounds per acre. This should be put on broadcast, if the beans are planted in the hill. If planted in the drill, which would probably be done if a large acreage was raised, put it in the drill and sow at the same time with the beans. Yellow eyes bring the best price of any on the market raised in the east, athough the ordinary white ones are considered easier to raise.
