KOCH'S LATEST FIND.

A Sure Cure for Diphtheria-Important Announcement by Dr. Edson.

New York, Aug. 24.—At a session of the State Board of Realth yesterday Dr. Cyrus A. Edson gave an account of the theory and practical application of Dr. Koch's last discovery, which he considers an absolute and infallible cure for diphtheria if applied within 36 hours after infection. It was the purpose of the health department, Dr. Edson announced, to ask from the board of estimate and apportionment a sufficient appropriation to establish a plant for the Summer Visitors in London and Lonproduction of this infallible specific, which otherwise would be too costly to be within the means of poor people. Dr. Edson asserted confidently that if the remedy was placed in the hands of the health department it would save annually the lives of 1,500 people in this city.

Fire in Oshawa. OSHAWA, Aug. 24 .- Early this morning

fire broke out in Pedlar's frame row of buildings on Simcoe street, in the premises occupied by F. W. Brooks, tailor. Brooks' Mr. H. Coon, Goderich. stock was completely destroyed. Loss, \$2,500; insured for \$1,300 in the Caledonian. The building was partly destroyed. Loss covered by insurance. Origin unknown.

A Tremendous Lock-Out. FALL RIVER, Mass., Aug. 24.-Last night marked the commencement of the greatest lock-out of textile operatives ever known in one center in America. Thirty-four mills, employing 21,950 hands, with a weekly pay roll of \$135,475, are idle. During this lockout the weavers will receive no assistance from their union, as they voted to dispense with benefits by voting to take a vacation. Whether the spinners will receive benefits will be determined at a meeting to be held next Monday night. The manufacturers by shutting down will avoid the necessity of supporting these mills that were compelled to shut down on account of the strike of the weavers.

Mr. Laurier and the Bagpipes. Today I come to address you, although I am of another race than yourselves, because it has been the will of Providence to gather new elements here in this country of ours out of which to make a new nation; because, in the words of the late Alexander Mackenzie, here on the 45th degree of latitude there is to be a new nation built up. (Applause.) But, if I may express a preference, my heart throbbed when I stepped upon your platform from the train and heard the sound of the bagpipes. Not because I am of Scottish origin, nor because it brought to my memory the scent of the heather, nor because it has been heard on all the battle fields of the world; but because, when a

boy, I was sent by my father-a thing I bless him for-to an English school, where most of the scholars were Scotch. I could not speak English, and the boys could not speak French, nor could the lassies speak French, which was worse for me. (Laughter.) But the boys could do what boys can always do; they could fight, and so the battle of Waterloo was fought over and over again. Those boys have grown to men; but they have not forgotten those days, and I am glad to count them among my best friends. (Applause.) - [Hon. Wilfrid Laurier at Brampton.
