LIGHT SNOWFALLS, MOSTLY FAIR, AND MODERATELY COLD.

TORONTO, Jan. 13.—11 p.m.—During Friday and Saturday depressions formed west and south of the storm, then dispersing north of the St. Lawrence and retarded the approach of the cold wave from the west. By Sunday morning, the depression having united, formed a storm center, which has since moved to the Ottawa valley, causing a snowfall throughout Ontario. A storm has entered the North-west Territories, bringing milder weather. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Edmonton, 22°-44°; Calgary, 42°-44°; Qu'Appelle, 20°-24°; Winnipeg, 18° below -6°; Toronto, 20°-19°; Montreal, 28°-35°; Quebec, 30°-30°; Halifax, 36°-42°.

TORONTO, Jan. 14.—1 a.m.—Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region (covering the peninsula and as far west as Belleville) are: Fresh winds; light local snow falls, but mostly fair and moderately cold.

—Mr. Frank Revell, Northern Pacific agent at Morris, Man., is in the city the guest of his brother-in-law, Mr. William Armstrong, G. T. R. dispatcher.

—Mrs. Mary Steeper, of McGillivray, has entered suit against Moses Lawson, lot 5, con. 19, for \$10,000 damages for breach of promise of marriage. The plaintiff is a widow. The case has been set for the winter assizes.

—Thomas Murphy, of Queen Street, was arrested yesterday morning on a charge of being drunk and disorderly. His family says he turned them out of the house about 10:30 on Saturday night and kept them out for over two hours.

—The journeyman bakers and confectioners of the city organized themselves into a union on Saturday night in Labor Hall. Mr. Fitzmeyer, of Toledo, Ohio, and several local speakers gave addresses, pointing out the many advantages which organization would bring. The charter list of members is large.

—Cookie Shrimpton, the pupil who passed highest in the last leaving examinations at the Chesley avenue school, was presented on Friday with a handsomely-bound volume of Tennyson's poems. The presentation was made by ex-Chairman MacRobert at the conclusion of the class.

—Annie Maria Ford, George Moore and Eliza Jane Burke have been transferred from the county jail to the asylum. The former two were arrested in the county as vagrants. Mrs. Burke is the wife of the blind peddler, George A. Burke, of 315 Dundas Street. She wandered from home not long ago, and it was thought she had suicided.

—Ernest Waspe, baker, of 559 Marshall Street, East London, was arrested on Saturday on two Ninth Division Court summonses. At the December sitting of the court Edward Adams & Co. and Horvenden Smith each obtained judgments against Waspe for about \$17. An order was made on him, but Waspe is alleged to have neglected to carry it out. He spent about an hour in the cells, when his friends made some arrangements whereby he was released.

—The Independent Order of Foresters have arranged to have Supreme Chief Ranger Orohahyataka and High Chief Ranger Collette, Toronto, with them at their anniversary proceedings on the evening of Jan. 22 at Aymer. The town hall and band have been engaged, and the courts of Vienna, Port Burwell, Springfield, Orwell, St. Thomas and Bayham will all assist to make the occasion a memorable Foresteric gathering. Other high court officers will be present, and after the public meeting in the hall there will be a banquet at the Mero House.

—One of the most noteworthy of the season's engagements at the Grand is that of Felix Morris next Thursday. Mr. Morris has justly won for himself a place among the great players of the time. Mr. Morris has not been seen in London since the time of Rosina Vokes, they starting together a repertoire including two and often three plays at a single performance. This is the second annual tour of Mr. Morris alone with his company, and his coming to the Grand is doubtless looked forward to with pleasure by those who appreciate high class art. The programme to be given includes a curtain-raiser and a new three-act comedy.

—An interesting case arising over the will of the late Hiram C. Comfort, of St. Thomas, is set for the assizes, which open today. Comfort died, leaving over \$100,000, nearly all of which went to the eldest daughter, Mrs. Hindmarsh, of the Railroad City. Deceased's second wife was very young, but for some reason she was left with the farm, was given \$5,000, the amount of mortgage on his farm, and nine grandchildren were left \$1,000 each. Elton Dier, a daughter, was left \$1,000, and Mary Toogood, another daughter, got \$4,000. Then \$500 was given each to the Amasa Wood Hospital and the Thomas Williams Home, and \$200 to the St. Thomas Y. M. C. A.

Commercial Travelers' Ball.

The Commercial Travelers' Association held a very large meeting at their rooms in the Masonic Temple, Saturday evening, when it was decided to give a grand ball in the Opera House Friday evening, Feb. 15. The guaranteed list of subscribers is very large, and energetic committees were appointed to look after all details. The ball promises to be one of the largest and most elaborate ever held in the city. Mr. E. R. C. Struthers was elected honorary secretary of the committee.

A Delightful Entertainment.

Judging by the programme prepared for the great Scottish celebration in the Grand Opera House on Wednesday evening, Jan. 23, Burns' anniversary concert, will be even more successful this year than last. The St. Andrew's Society have enlisted the aid of the cream of London and western vocalists, dancers and pipers, and have also engaged the celebrated J. H. Cameron, the noted Scottish funny man, who will appear on the programme during the evening. His songs, humorous, practical and sentimental, and stories make him second only to Kennedy. "Goldie delighted the celebrants last year; Cameron will entrance them," writes one who recently heard the noted comedian. It was arranged at the meeting on Saturday night to place the tickets within the reach of every citizen. They can be had of the committee and at the usual places as advertised.

Banks of Snow.

The snow storm that prevailed over the Michigan Peninsula on Saturday became general throughout Western Ontario early Tuesday morning and continued with more or less force during the day. The snow thawed rapidly on Saturday, and the abundant downfall and lower temperature of yesterday will set the minds of those who were afraid of losing the sleighing at rest. The railways were affected more or less, although the G. T. R. express trains arrived within an hour of their scheduled time. The storm was felt worse at the Niagara and Windsor ends of the line than it was anywhere else, and more than one freight train was stalled. Stock and perishable trains were pushed through with an effort. The G. T. P. R. also suffered by the storm, and was managed to get through without mishap.

After an Alleged Horse Thief.

Beverly Burwell, of this city, is being eagerly sought after by Constable R. W. Ward and Luke Jeffery. He is charged with horse stealing. On Friday Burwell hired a horse and rig at Duffon's livery, saying that he wanted to take a short drive into the country. He took a little boy along with him, but when Lambeth was reached the youth was unceremoniously dumped on the side of the road. Burwell drove to Delaware and the boy came to London. Saturday morning Mr. Duffon was informed of the state of affairs, and the constables have been on the trail ever since. Burwell was traced to Mount Brydges, Strathroy, Kerwood and Napier. They managed to reach Wardville, where they secured a fresh rig and returned to this city. Burwell is believed to have driven to Thamesville, and Ward is going to take a trip that way. The stolen horse and rig have been located and are now in good hands.

Murder at a Christening.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Jan. 14.—At a Hungarian christening in Hanover township last night four men participated in a sanguinary fight. Revolvers and knives were freely used. Two died.

Bill Cook Captured.

FORT STANTON, N. M., Jan. 15.—"Bill" Cook, the notorious train robber, murderer and outlaw, was safely landed in the county jail at Roswell, N. M., yesterday, and is heavily guarded. He will be shipped east as soon as arrangements can be made. The rewards for his capture by railroads, express companies and state authorities aggregate \$15,000.
