WITH AMBULANCE

Famous Hospital Dog Loses Life in Hurry Up Trip

WAS BARKING TO CLEAR A WAY

-Had a Record for Saving Human Life.

New York, Nov. 21. - Sounding an alarm with her short, quick barks, Nelwho has made her home in the stable yesterday afternoon on the way to answer a "hurry call" from the mounted police station in the park.

At Eighth avenue and Eighty-sixth street the dog, who was half a block in the lead of the ambulance, stopped short and barked furiously. A truck was approaching and would cross directly in the path of the ambulance. The driver of the truck drove on stolidly. Nellie stood her ground. The hoofs of the two heavy horses beat the life out of the little spaniel, and the iron-shod wheels of the truck crushed her body. The ambulance, going at craped paint off its side against the truck.

The ambulance kept on its way at full speed, for a human's life is worth more than a dog's. Its mission fulfilled-and it was not so important, after all-the ambulance returned at a faster gait than usual, with the driver and a surgeon on the lookout for Nellie. They found a liverand-white derelict, abandoned of life, ying on the street pavement. The little body was put in the ambulance and

will be buried near the spot where Nellie used to wait for calls for the ambulance. She was the invariable companion of the ambulance when it answered a call. She ran ahead, telling all to clear the way. Her interest did not end with the run, for she would watch the surgeon at his work and then clear the way through the crowd for the return

Nellie not only watched the work of the surgeons, but was a life-saver herself. Last summer a little girl fell into one of the lakes in Central Park. Women and children screamed in fright, but none made an effort to save the drowning child. Nellie, always attracted by a crowd, ran up promptly, jumped into the water and held the little girl up until a man came up and pulled dog and baby out of the water. The surgeons grieved for their pet. She is lost to them now, and they believe that she has found her own reward.
