The Tigers defeated the Argos at Montreal by a score of 19 to 7. It is safe to say that the populace did not embrace the new rules. It will be like the soccer game, get lots of kind words said about it, but will never be adopted by the multitude.

The University of Michigan team has won 51 games in the last five years and has not lost one. The nearest to defeat that the team has been was in 1903, when Minnesota held them to a tie game, 6 all. The highest score that the team has made was 130 against West Virginia in 1904. The lowest score was 6 points against Wisconsin and Minnesota. During the five years they have had only 40 points scored against them. The University of Chicago scored 12 last year, and that has been the largest in Hurry-up Yost's time. In the first year of Yost's work, 1901, Michigan scored 500, opponents, 0; in 1902, Michigan, 644, opponents, 12; in 1903, Michigan, 565, opponents, 6; in 1904, Michigan, 567, opponents, 22; in 1905, Michigan, 450, with Chicago, and Oberlin to play yet. His team this year is said to be a wonderful one, although it has not scored nearly so many points as in other years. It would be worth while to see Michigan as the best in the west play the acknowledged champions of the east, Yale. That game would be worth taking a long jaunt to see.

In 1904 there were 3,000 two-year-olds named in the books of the Eastern Jockey Club. Of these there were about 1,500 that faced the starter, and what is more, only a trifle over 50 per cent of these earned money; meaning horses that finished first, second or third. Out of the 1,500 starters, however, there were something like 700 that won races. Hence it will be seen that out of all the horses bred each year not more than 25 per cent are recorded winners in their two-year-old career, and not nearly 25 per cent get their names on the credit books of the many associations in this country.

There was a great deal of talk as to what a jolly lot of bouts the tars on the warships were to have and how all the other tars would look on and applaud. They had it all fixed up for the sailors to fight twenty-round championship battles on shore, so that all of the seamen could see the slaughter. Of course there would have been no trouble in having the bouts take place on one of the ships, but there wouldn't have been enough room for the spectators. The jolly tars were told that it was a grave misdemeanor for two men to box with soft gloves in New York, although 22 men could fight with bare fists, providing they went to college. Therefore, the jolly tars went up to McAdoo and asked him to see to it that they were not interfered with during the fights. Of course, McAdoo blithely informed the tars that it would be impossible for the boat sailor boys to do any fighting on the land, and they went away declaring that this is a free country in name only.

Only one bout was brought off, and that went to the British heavyweight, Tom Sharkey's guess was away to the bad, and the British tars took a bunch of Yankee money with them. The Englishman gets Prince Louis' cup.

Tommy Mowatt, a featherweight, who has fought around Chicago with varying success for the past five years, and who, though not a topnotcher, has made several of the stars hustle hard to beat him, will probably be Terry McGovern's next opponent. Mowatt made his Philadelphia debut Wednesday night when he chased the elusive Attel for six weary rounds around a Philadelphia ring. Mowatt is not famed for his cleverness, but is strong as a bull and rushes like a wild man. He will furnish a good try-out for Terry, and the bout will go far to answer the question whether Terry has really returned to his old-time form.

Locanda, the pacing sensation of the year, came out as a 3-year-old, scoring a record of 2:16 1/4, and sold for \$3,500. This he reduced to 2:13 1/4 at four, to 2:07 1/4 at five to 2:05 1/4 at six, to 2:03 1/4 at seven, and to 2:02 this year at eight. Such consistent year improvement—always in races—is almost unequalled.

Mr. Charles Brothers, of Stratford, Ont., one of the best-known and most popular horsemen of Stratford, Ont., intends entering Oro Wilkes, Jun. 22:14 in the stake events through the Great Western circuit next season. This trotter has been a mile in 2:10, and but for a wretched sendoff at the Buffalo Grand Circuit meeting last August would have been a select society trotter. He was given the word "go" on a break with only three starters, and this error of judgment cost our Canadian friends a fortune. — Buffalo Courier.

The champion trotting team of Canada, Mary Scott (2:14), and Jennie Scott (2:14 1/2), were recently purchased by Mr. John Crabtree, of Boston, Mass., at a long price. They are owners, sired by Bryson (2:15), son of Simmons, and were developed and raced successfully several seasons by that clever knight of the sulky, Mr. A. Collins, of Hamilton. They are the fastest span of full sisters in the world and were named in honor of the daughters of Mr. Scott, of Toronto, who formerly owned Bryson (2:15).

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Galt Defeats Petrolea In Junior Semi-Finals

Oil-Town "Boys" Were Worn Down in Second Half of a Fine Game.

Galt defeated Petrolea in the semi-finals of the Junior O. R. F. U. series at Tecumseh Park on Saturday by a score of 4 to 2. It was the best football game seen in the city this year, and was one of the most stubbornly-contested games ever played in the city. Galt won by wearing down their opponents in the last part of the game. Neither team had its line crossed, and the points scored in the game being singles.

Galt won because of its superior back division. They are the fastest and shiftest backs seen here in many a long day. They all can punt well, and are very fast runners, and can hit the line hard. Kent was perhaps the star, with Christman a close second. Both of them played a very fine game, pulling off many spectacular runs, and making much ground by their fine kicking. Dakin played a strong game and punted very finely. Brady, who is said to be very fast, did not shine, although he did some useful work. Eagan, at quarter, was splendid. He passed fast and accurately, his long passes to the halves being nearly always well taken, and nearly always netting good gains. He followed up very fast, and was always in the midst of the play.

STRONG WING LINE. The Galt wing line was strong. Petrolea's wings had the best of them on the start, but the Galt boys wore them down, and had much the better of it at the end. The pick of the Galt wings was Buschlen, whose bucking the line was a feature. He always made his way to the end of the line, and was a hard man to bring down. Towser Hunt played a great game—with his jaw. As a gab artist, he has Empey still beaten to a pulp. The Galt team were all splendid tacklers, and brought down their men in good style. Both teams had men knocked out by hard tackles, and it was mainly due to the fact that they have not learned to protect themselves while indulging in that branch of the game.

The Petrolea team did not play as well as they have done. Their back division did not work smoothly, and they seemed to be slow in signal work. Outside of McKay, not one of the backs could kick a little bit. McKay had to do all the punting, and his work at the end of the game along this line was good. As it has been, Rae pulled off one or two good runs, but did not do much after he was knocked out in the first half. The other halves did not play up to their usual form. That Petrolea wing line was splendid. They followed up fast and had much the best of it in the first half.

LINE WAS NOT CROSSED. The Petrolea scores were due to the

work of the wings. Even in the second half, when the tide of victory dead set against them, they played hard, and their defensive work was splendid. Timmer, after time, with the Galt team right on their line, they would force them back, and had the satisfaction, after the game, of knowing that their line was not crossed.

Dick Biggs was referee and his work was good. He understood the rules perfectly, and his decisions were given on his knowledge of them. There was very little dirty work that he did not get. Galt made a mistake in a touchdown, but Biggs was perfectly right in not allowing it. Harold Clark, referee, was umpire. His work was good.

Western Championship Is To Michigan University

Old Eli Devours the Princeton Tigers in a Hard Game—Harvard Tied.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Nov. 18.—Before a crowd of over 20,000 people, the largest ever seen on Ferry field, Michigan met Wisconsin, and the football championship of the west was decided. It was a perfect day for the game, the field was dry and in excellent condition. Wisconsin's team was accompanied by over a thousand rooters. The final score was: Michigan 12, Wisconsin 0. At the close of the game, the end standing bleachers, containing 2,500 people, fell with a crash. The entire field was appalled at the sight, expecting many killed. Everyone uttered a prayer of thanks when it was learned that with the exception of one leg having his leg broken and many bruised and cut, no one was seriously hurt. The spectators from these bleachers were then admitted to the field, where they sat on the side lines for the rest of the game.

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Varsity and Ottawa to Meet on Nov. 25

Toronto, Nov. 18.—At a meeting of the O. R. F. U. on Saturday night in the King Edward Hotel, it was agreed that "Varsity and Ottawa City should play on Saturday, Nov. 25, on the Rosedale grounds, Toronto, and an effort will be made to bring together the winners of that game and the Hamilton Tigers.

In connection with the intermediate championship, Ottawa II, and R. M. C. Kingston, will play in Brockville on Saturday next. If Ottawa wins the final game will be played at Brockville on Saturday, Dec. 2. If R. M. C. and Kingston are in the finals the game will take place in Peterboro, and if R. M. C. and Peterboro are contestants in the final game. There was very little discussion.

FIRST GAME ENDED IN A TIE--4 TO 4

Dundas and Peterboro Play Good Rugby at Dundas for Intermediate Champ.

Dundas, Nov. 18.—The first game of the final of the intermediate championship of the O. R. F. U. was played here today between Dundas and Peterboro, resulting in a tie, 4 to 4.

Peterboro brought about 150 rooters with them.

The game was very closely contested, the opposing wing lines being very evenly matched. Peterboro played a kicking game by a score of 4 to 0. Dundas played a strong bucking game, and were successful in breaking through the Peterboro line a number of times and gaining their yards. While the game was very close, there was not a great deal of rough play, only two Dundas men and three Peterboro men being ruled out.

The first half ended 4 to 1 in favor of Dundas. In the second half Peterboro scored three more points, making the total score 4 to 4. Two of Peterboro's points in this half were given as a penalty for interference behind the Dundas line. Kelly got out with the ball, but the referee gave Peterboro the points.

Fieldrick, of the Peterboro team, was hurt in the first half, and was replaced by Quintan. In the second half Ford of Peterboro was hurt, and Grant went off to even up.

THE INTERMEDIATE CUP CONTESTS AT HONORS TO R. M. C. CLOSE OF SEASON

Cadets Defeat 'Varsity on the Round 29 to 10—Ottawa College Beaten Again.

Kingston, Nov. 18.—The Royal Military College team won the intermediate championship of Intercollegiate Union this afternoon by defeating Varsity II, by 11 to 4. The half-time score being 5 to 1. The score on the round is 29 to 10 for R. M. C. Cadets were runners up for the championship last year, McLeod beating them out. Owing to an unexpected demonstration by Queen's students against them the R. M. C. got over a couple of dozen battery men to keep the field clear.

COLLEGE BEATEN AGAIN. Toronto, Nov. 18.—The final game in the Intercollegiate series was played this afternoon on Varsity field, between the Toronto University team and Ottawa College. Though it was a championship contest, nothing depended on the result, as the championship of spectators looked on the incident more like a simple exhibition of Rugby football than a decisive contest. Varsity won by 20 to 11. The winners were superior everywhere. Their line was stronger than Ottawa's, so was the scrumming, and the difference averaged up a shade the better. There was miffing and fumbling on both sides throughout the entire contest, and it was hardly a first-class exhibition. McLeod again supplied the feature of the match, making some spirited runs around the end, though a fiasco on the other side was a fairly good second, gaining many yards by fast runs with the ball. Young Mr. De-rocher, who has been heralded as a sensational half-back, performed a very phenomenal stunt.

VICS TAKE SEMI-FINALS. Belleville, Nov. 18.—The Victoria II Rugby team defeated Gananoque today by 8-1, in the semi-final of the O. R. F. U. junior championship. The Victorians held their opponents all the way. Snow fell last night and the field was covered with about two inches of it, which had melted in spots, the resulting conditions, for football purposes, being excellent. In the first half the Victorians scored 8 points to Gananoque's 1, the playing most of the time being in the Victoria half. In the second half there was no scoring, though towards the last the Gananoque players played up stronger and pressed the Victorians hard.
