MANY CHINESE PAUPERS

Relatives Paid Passage and Head Tax
—All Had Promise of Work.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 13. — The shipment of pauper labor, with relatives in China advancing the \$60 passage money and the \$500 head tax, was brought out by Commission King in examination today of twelve of the 72 Celestials who had paid \$36,000 in taxes on arrival of the Empress of India.

Some of the twelve examined had a dollar, but all had written or verbal promises of work here, and in the Northwest. One was compelled to remain here till a friend in Moosejaw sent his fare and money for board. Two had tickets to Toronto, having promises of employment in laundries. One admitted he came here to attend school, with the expectation of the usual refund of the head tax at the end of the first year, as the act provides. There is some doubt as to whether the promise of employment is of a character sufficient to cover a violation of the alien labor laws.

All of these things and more are held out as an inducement to that much sought person, the model maid, by D. Van Ness Persons, 3240 Rhodes avenue. Mr. Persons, who is the publisher of a trade journal, has become tired of the "general run" of maids, and he has decided to get one on whom he can rely if he is compelled to divide his income with her.

What is more, Mr. Persons has decided to surprise his wife with the best maid in Chicago and hire her if she demands \$10,000 a year.

Then Mr. Persons seated himself at his typewriter and penned—or type-writered, to be exact—the following lines:

"Wanted—Maid for housework, fruit, candy and preserves furnished in plenty. AERIAL CONQUESTS OF ENGLISHMAN

London Journalist Breaks All Aeroplane Records at the French Capital.

London, Nov. 13.—All aeroplane records have been beaten by Mr. Henry Farman, a well-known English newspaper correspondent in Paris, who on the busy drill ground outside the walls of the French capital made a flight on Saturday of nearly half a mile at an average speed of 30 miles an hour.

The flight was accomplished in the presence of the aeroplane committee of the French Aero Club and of a large number of enthusiastic spectators. Mr. Farman was immediately awarded the Archdeacon cup, at present in the possession of M. Santos Dumont.

Mr. Farman began his experiments about half-past ten in the morning, and in the presence of many well-known aeronauts and motorists made a short flight of a couple of hundred yards, thus showing that his machine was in perfect condition.

At this point he witnessed an accident to the military airship Patrie, which was overhead. One of the propellers fell off and the Patrie immediately shot up and disappeared in the clouds. The propeller fell harmless into an empty street. The accident caused much excitement, and, jumping on his motor car, Mr. Farman went to the military ballooning establishment at Chalais-Meudon to give notice of the accident.

He then decided to summon the aeroplane committee of the French Aero Club for an afternoon trial, and at half-past three he was back on the drill ground, where the members of the committee had already arrived. At 3 o'clock the machine was brought out of the shed, and soon afterwards Mr. Farman made his first flight of 353 yards, at 27 seconds, at a height of between ten and twelve feet from the ground.

This he followed by a second flight of 440 yards in 31 1/2 seconds, and this broke all official records. He was about to take his machine back to the shed when he was induced to make another trial, and a curious scene took place. The aeroplane hopped and jumped along in the thick mud for a couple of hundred yards, and then, with a buzzing, whirling sound, left the ground, rose to a height of twelve feet, and moved smartly forward in a series of undulatory movements, now approaching to within three feet of the earth, and then rising again to thirteen or fourteen feet.

The machine went straight on towards the moat of the city walls, on which hundreds of people were standing, and it looked as though Mr. Farman were about to drive right into the wall when, at the last moment, he turned, and, having stopped the motor, came gently to earth, thus showing that he had the most perfect control over the aeroplane under all conditions.

BEHEADED BY ARABS

Rash Young Frenchman's Terrible Fate at Casa Blanca.

London, Nov. 13.—A tragic fate has befallen M. Maurice Kuntzer, a young Frenchman, who for some weeks had been living at Casa Blanca, M. Kuntzer, who was the son of a Paris banker, was in the habit, in spite of warnings, of taking walks outside the town, often wandering beyond the outposts and venturing over the Arab lands.

At last the inevitable happened. He went out one day as usual, but this time mounted on a mule, and never returned. His fate was not long left in doubt. Arabs who came from the Moorish camp to the French lines told the sad tale. When well out into the country, M. Kuntzer was attacked by ten brigands, and he and his mule were severely wounded by the pursuing bandits, and fell.

Resolved to sell his life dearly, the young Frenchman emptied his revolver on his assailants, killing one and wounding another. But they continued to fire at him, and at last he fell severely wounded. The brigands then approached and finished their murderous work. They stole everything that he had on him, and treated his body with great brutality.

Afterwards they cut off his head, which, together with that of an Algerian tirailleur who was killed during the last fight, is now exposed at the Moorish camp as a trophy of victory.

of the various foods and their nutritive values. Miss Parkins lectures on these themes to the young ladies, and by means of regular courses in this particular branch of the nurse's work, they are splendidly equipped for their life work. How to feed a sick patient is a very important matter, and its great importance is being insisted upon of late. In many diseases nowadays scientific feeding is of vast importance, and the fact that the authorities of Victoria Hospital have not neglected this important branch of the nurse's training, but rather have been pioneers in the field, is a matter of congratulation.

An Advertiser reporter was a visitor at the hospital yesterday, and was taken in charge by Miss M. Stanley, the lady superintendent, and was shown all through the big building. As everything is so spotlessly clean, and corridors are so brightly lit, and the amount of work that amazes a mere man. By 10 o'clock, the numerous nurses and attendants have done a great deal of hard work, and the physician and surgeon to begin his work. This routine day after day is carried out, and the great procession of the world's ill moves on apace within the walls. The countless bandages, dressings, medicines, and other paraphernalia, making up common necessities of hospital life, are really wonderful when looked at closely. The necessities of modern surgery are infinite in variety and number.

The Diet Kitchen.

But to return to the diet kitchen. Miss Parkins has a class of six nurses constantly under her care. They work in the kitchen with her, and learn the art from beginning to end. They have practical demonstrations, and have soon acquired a working knowledge.

Their knowledge is, of course, reinforced by lectures and demonstrations during the balance of their course, and by the time a young lady has finished her three years' probation, she is not only thoroughly trained in the art of nursing, but also in the art of cooking for the sick. This is especially valuable to her, and adds considerably to her education. It is a scientific course in domestic science both for sick and well. This is a great step in advance. A course somewhat similar to that of Victoria Hospital is in vogue in the Sick Children's Hospital at Toronto, although not on so ambitious a scale. Miss Parkins and Miss Stanley, the lady superintendent, are enthusiastic over the work, and are hopeful that it will result in great things for the hospital.

The children's pavilion and sun-room at Victoria has been thoroughly overhauled of late, and a splendid new linoleum has been laid on the floors. This was done by the members of the Woman's Auxiliary. The rooms are singularly bright and cheerful.

While the hospital is the scene of much that is disquieting, and much that is distressing, there is, nevertheless, here, there is the bright side, and that bright spot seems to be centered in the maternity ward, where the wee bits of humanity are ushered into the world. Here as many as fifteen little milks to nurse them, they have to be labeled or they will get terribly mixed up, are to be found, and a prettier sight could scarcely be witnessed than this. Yesterday the "kiddies" were on their good behavior, and as a result, they were much admired, more so than usual, by the male members of the party.

As Superintendent Heard pointed out yesterday Victoria Hospital is getting to be a very big institution. With the isolation hospital, and shortly a Hygienic Institute, and then perhaps a medical school in the same neighborhood, a pile of buildings devoted to the study of the health, and the prevention of the disease of humanity will be a distinct credit to London, and to Ontario.

"London is not half proud of its hospitals," said an American to the writer the other day. "There are very few places in America of the same size that can boast of so splendid institutions."

DR. FISCHER'S LATEST POEMS

New Volume, "The Toiler," Issued by Former London Physician.

A new volume of poems has been issued by Dr. W. J. Fischer, who has many friends in this city, being a graduate of the medical department of the Western University, and having been house surgeon at St. Joseph's Hospital for two years. These latest offerings of his muse have been gathered together under the title of "The Toiler." The one hundred and more selections testify to Dr. Fischer's literary industry and fertility. Many of them are poetic nature studies. They show a fine eye for the manifold beauties of earth and sky and lake and river, and they express melodiously the moods and reflections which nature inspires in the poet's mind. Dr. Fischer finds poetry in everything within his range of observation, from a summer rose or a snowfall to a street Arab or an old piano. The sentiment of his poems is always elevated, and he evidently believes in the moral power of his art.
