JUDGMENT FIVE YEARS AFTER JUDGE'S DEATH

His lordship had not issued the judgment at his death, and no application for its issue was made until this morning, when J. E. Jones, acting for one of the defendants, took out the judgment. The case is out of the ordinary in more ways than one. 


