COMPANY WANTS TO DIVERT WATER STREET

Many St. Marys Citizens Are Strongly Opposed to Project.

St. Marys, March 5.—After the council adjourned last night, a deputation of interested parties of the Thames Quarry Company, held an informal meeting with the members of the town council in reference to the diverting of that portion of Water street that runs through the company's quarries, and have that portion diverted on to Wellington street.

The company agrees to buy the rock contained in the street, to offset, they claim, to pay cost of diverting Water street on to Wellington street. A large number of residents of the streets and also a number of business men of Water street, informed The Advertiser that they are opposed to the proposition as the small amount of cash offered would not pay the upkeep of the diverted road, and also that it would be a great injury to business on Water street.

A petition is now being widely circulated, and a large number are signing it to oppose the submitting of any bylaw for that purpose.

DEPOSITORS PAID DEMANDS PROMPTLY

Senseless Run on Montreal City and District Savings Bank.

Montreal, March 4.—Upwards of a million dollars was withdrawn by depositors today as a result of what is described by the officers and management of the Montreal City and District Savings Bank as being a wholly ridiculous and motive-lacking run. The run opened at noon and continued throughout the afternoon and evening, being for the most part confined to the Point St. Charles, St. Lawrence, corner Pine avenue; St. Denis, corner Rachel, and West St. Catherine street branches.

All depositors demanding their money had their wishes complied with, and the bank officials state that they are ready to meet all demands. They attribute the uneasiness of depositors to some groundless rumor which has gained currency. They do not, however, anticipate any continuation of the run.

When the news of the run first reached the president, ex-Judge Oulmet, and his colleagues of the board of directors, they took every step to reassure all comers, giving instructions that all depositors desiring to withdraw their accounts should have their wishes complied with. MEXICANS AND AMERICANS IN BORDER BATTLE

Former Fire on U. S. Patrol and Are Routed by Cavalry Troops.

[Canadian Press.]

Douglas, Ariz., March 4.—A second skirmish occurred today between the Ninth Cavalry troops and Mexican federal soldiers from Agua Prieta, one and one-half miles southeast of Douglas. The Mexicans fired on a distance of 250 yards.

In answer to a battery call troops "E" and "F" and a machine gun platoon of the Ninth Cavalry were rushed to the place where the Mexicans had fired on the patrol squad. A rapid fire was put in immediate operation, in addition to a hot rifle fire.

The Mexicans returned the fire with spirit, but soon retreated to a line of trenches dug during the Madero revolution. When they reached the trenches the firing ceased. Whether any Mexicans were killed or wounded is not known. None of the American troops were hit.

Col. Guilfoyle took personal command of the troops at the scene of today's fighting, which is a repetition of the battle of Sunday, when Mexican federal and United States troops fought for a half hour over the international line. The American soldiers are drawn up this afternoon in a skirmish line awaiting further developments.

DR. FRIEDMAN'S REQUEST IS TURNED DOWN

Cannot Demonstrate His Cure in a New York Public Hospital.

New York, March 5.—Dr. Friedman's request for an opportunity to demonstrate his treatment for tuberculosis in a hospital controlled by the board of health was turned down last night. It remains to be seen whether or not any private incorporated hospital lets him in the face of this official refusal. If not, he apparently must go away from this city in order to give his remedy the test which he professes to desire.

The board of health's decision was made known in this statement from Commissioner Lederer:

"On advice of the medical administrative board of the board of health it has been decided not to make at the present time official clinical tests of any specific treatment of tuberculosis."

Dr. Lederer would not say what reason was behind his pronouncement. The advisory board, he served, simply did not "think a clinical test expedient at this time." He added that the health board would be glad to accept and test a sample of the Friedman's bacillus if the German investigator chose to give it, and that the board did not intend to interfere with whatever plans Dr. Friedman has involving hospitals not within the health board's province.

LOSS OF \$100,000 IN PALMERSTON FIRE

Canada Malting Company's Big Plant Is Now Pile of Ashes.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Palmerston, March 4.—The largest fire in the history of Palmerston was witnessed last night, when the Canada Malting Company's plant was burned to the ground. The fire started shortly after 12 o'clock in the top story of the southwest corner of the elevator. It was impossible to reach this height with water or hose. At about 5 o'clock the worst of the flames were quenched. The loss is estimated at \$100,000, and is fairly well covered by insurance.

The Palmerston branch of the Canada Malting Company, Ltd., formerly known as L. H. Clarke & Co., has the second largest malting floor in Canada.

FOREIGN AIRCRAFT WARNED

Must Not Fly Across British Isles Without Govt.'s Permission.

London, March 5.—Under authority conferred by the aerial navigation act the Home Secretary has issued orders prohibiting foreign military or naval aircraft from passing over any portion of the United Kingdom or territorial waters except on invitation and by permission of the Government.

All over foreign air craft coming to the United Kingdom are required first to obtain clearance papers from the British consuls. Landings will be restricted to certain areas of the coast, where the air pilots must report to the authorities and obtain a permit for the continuance of the voyage. They are prohibited from passing over certain districts, in which are included the military and naval stations.

Anyone infringing the regulations, it is announced, is liable to be fined upon, and the infringement is punishable by a six months' imprisonment and a \$1,000 fine. The aeronauts found guilty of espionage are liable to seven years' penal servitude.

RAILWAY BILLS ARE OPPOSED IN SENATE

Govt. Seeks Undue Measure of Control, Sir George Ross Points Out.

Ottawa, March 4.—In the Senate today Sir George Ross opposed Government bills to extend the time for the completion of the prairie and mountain sections. Under the law of that session the time had been extended and the road had been almost completed. A still more time only was required, and this bill, which had the approval of the railway company, was only to confirm and extend previous action by Parliament. In view of the facts, the Government could not expect the Senate to support the bills. The Government was financially interested in the bill through its relations with the company and both were interested in seeing the bill carried through, so that the financial operations of the company could be carried out in the British money market.

Might Degrade Road.
Sir George Ross said he favored the extension of the bills, but wanted the extension specified by Parliament. He did not want the Government to have authority to specify the terms and conditions under which the road should be constructed. It was rumored that the Government was degrading the eastern section. What assurance was there that it would not degrade the road if given authority by this bill? He proposed an extension of time for twelve months. The attention of the Senate had not been attracted to the bill when it was promoted last year. The legislation authorized the Government to "extend the time on such terms and conditions and for such periods" as may be deemed advisable. That gave too much liberty to depart from settled conditions.

Government Deeply Interested.
Sir Mackenzie Bowell said in this case the Government was virtually building the road through its guarantees. Therefore it was much more interested in the speedy completion of this road than in the case of an ordinary bill. There was no danger that the Government would degrade the road. The bill gave it no authority to do so. He was sure the Government had no intention or desire to do so. Senator Gibson urged that more time be given to the matter. Mr. Loughheed agreed, and the committee rose and reported progress on the bill.

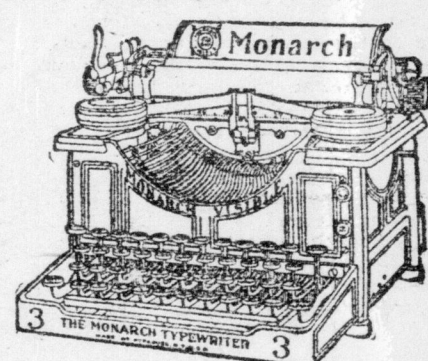
