

#### RAILWAY BILLS ARE OPPOSED IN SENATE

Govt. Seeks Undue Measure of Control, Sir George Ross Points Out.

Ottawa, March 4 .- In the Senate today Sir George Ross opposed Government hills from the Commons respecting the G. T. P. Railway and the National Transcontinental Railway, not, he said, because he was hostile to the companies. The bill proposed to place the right to extend the time for con-struction in the hands of the Government, which was by the bill given authority to specify the time of comple-




