

MODERN DANCE IS CONDEMNED

C. S. E. T. Boys Told Not To
Permit Name "Jazz
Hounds."

Taylor Statten Declares
Dance Big Factor in the
National Character.

In his condemnation of the present day dance, Taylor Statten, national executive secretary of C. S. E. T. work for Canada, declared before more than 500 boys in the "Y" on Friday night: "Don't let anyone point their finger at you and say, 'There goes a jazz hound.'"

The occasion was the closing supper of the C. S. E. T. boys in the city. The new boys council was also duly sworn in by City Clerk Baker, and prizes and shields were awarded for the national athletic meet, boys' week, and the Tuxis and Trail Ranger championships of the city.

"Dancing has a very great bearing on national character, and in the United States last year more than 65,000 girls disappeared. And in the majority of cases their downfall was attributed to jazz dancing."

Mr. Statten urged the lads, as Tuxis and Trail Ranger boys, to live up to the fourfold ideal of life, symbolized by the four H's—the head, the heart, the hand and the health.

Supper served at 6:30, and was followed by a sing-song. Then the new chairman of the Boys' Work Board, A. R. Kennedy, and the executive were introduced. Mr. Kennedy gave a short address, in which he explained the work done by the board. Millard Grant proposed a toast to Taylor Statten and the C. S. E. T. The toast was responded to by Taylor Statten.

The Pirates are the champion Tuxis group of the season and were presented with the Kiwanis Shield by Wm. Christianson, who also presented the Rotarian Shield to the Knox Wingfoots for obtaining the highest honors amongst the Trail Ranger pennants.

The other presentations were: The hockey shield to the Junior St. Matthews by George Wesley; the basketball shields, junior to the Wingfoots, and senior to the Pirates; the Gordon Cummings, a pennant in their series and a shield to the Estimers of St. Paul's.

A., presented the Tuxis all-around efficiency cup to the Ahmecks, and the Trail Ranger all-around efficiency medals were awarded to J. Manuel and E. Hadfield by the donor, Stanley Howard. The T. R. 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3 FOUND GUILTY IN ASSAULT CASE

Mrs. Wm. Taylor Fined \$25.
Mr. Taylor and Frank
Atwood Remanded.

Mr. and Mrs. William Taylor and Frank Atwood were found guilty in police court Saturday morning of assaulting William Walsh with intent to do actual bodily harm on Thursday night last. Mrs. Taylor was fined \$25 and costs, while the two men were remanded till May 17 for sentence.

Walsh, in the witness-box, stated that he was walking home on Oxford street west, when he heard footsteps behind him. Taylor walked up in front of him and wanted to talk, but Walsh refused to have any conversation with him.

"He grabbed hold of me and I threw him," said Walsh. Then his wife went at me with the butt of a whip. I didn't see her till she struck me. She pounded me over the head and stunned me."

"I was on top of Taylor and Atwood grabbed me by the legs and threw me over, kicking me in the ribs as he did so," continued the witness, a gray-haired man, who finally managed to get his back against a nearby fence.

"They were going to throw me in the Evoy's office and make me withdraw a case I had against them in division court. Mr. Jeffries came up and they stopped."

Questioned by J. M. Donahue, counsel for defence, Walsh admitted getting a letter from the late crown attorney, J. B. McKillop, requesting Walsh to stop annoying Mrs. Taylor, at whose home he had previously boarded.

Dr. H. E. Arkell told of dressing wounds on Walsh's head.

F. Jeffries told of arriving on the scene of action and finding Walsh beaten up.

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City Revision Court To Define Meaning of "Partner"

Relates to Annex Income Tax.

Is a shareholder a partner within the meaning of the assessment act?

Monday night, the court of revision is to face the above problem as it relates to annex income taxes. The decision will have an important bearing on the question brought up by Ald. Douglas in regard to income being assessed at the 15-mill rate instead of at a regular rate.

The whole problem was raised by the alderman will not be decided if a decision is given, but, nevertheless, it will have an important bearing on at least a part of his contentions. More important, however, will the decision be if the appellant wins, as it will have a serious effect on the revenue which the city may get in 1923 from income taxation.

Ald. Douglas has contended that incomes in the annex do not come under the annex agreement, and are, therefore, liable for the full tax rate. The problem was sent to the city solicitor for his opinion, and in the meantime the city assessor's department set about to increase the revenue from income taxes to the fullest extent possible by changing the place of assessment.

Many residents of the city proper have assessed at their place of business in the annex, with the result that they paid income taxes at the rate of 15 mills.

Section 1 of 12 of the assessment act allows assessment at place of business or residence, subject only to subsection 4 of section 40.

The assessment department took advantage of this changed assessment for income from business offices to residences, and this action has brought about an appeal, the contention being that a partner is involved, and he, therefore, must be assessed at his place of business.

This would bring them under subsection 2 of section 12 of the assessment act, which states the income of a partnership or an incorporated company shall be assessed against them at their place of business, subject also as is subsection 1 to section 6 of 40.

It is being contended by Ald. Douglas that all incomes are assessable against the individual, and shall be assessed under section 1 of 12, but there are exceptions to this—subsection 1 of 14 and 6 of 40. The former relates to telephone companies, and provides how they shall be assessed, and the latter shall be assessed as earned in the municipality; the second, to mines, oil and gas wells, of which there are none in London.

The questions to be decided on the matter are: Is a stockholder a partner? Is a stockholder a partner in 29 concerns, is he to be assessed individually at each?

If a man holds stock in a concern in the city proper and stock in the annex, can he have his whole income assessed in the annex at 15 mills? If individuals itemize the stock held, but do not designate where held, thus as matters size up the problem for the court of revision promises to be a knotty one if the appeal against assessment in the city as against the annex is pressed.

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BELIEVES BOARD ONLY SOLUTION

John Colbert, Carmen's Head,
Thinks Government Body
Needed in Dispute.

John M. McEvoy, Chairman,
Unable To Set Meeting
Date At Present.

Although the suggestion has emanated from certain quarters that possibly the motormen and conductors employed by the London Street Railway company and the company's representatives might be able to smooth over their differences without the services of a board of conciliation, John Colbert, president of the Street Railwaymen's Union, is just a little skeptical as to the same.

He is of the opinion, he explained Saturday, that from present indications that the union's protest against the three-cent an hour wage reduction, effective since March 1 last, can only receive proper consideration from a government board of conciliation.

President Colbert headed the recent deputation from the carmen's executive, which journeyed to Toronto this week to combat the ultimatum passage of the company's private bill for an increased fare. Apparently realizing the futility of such expeditions, he advised the London Labor Party Friday not to send a similar delegation to the legislature.

Questioned Saturday morning John M. McEvoy, K. C., who was selected by Hon. James Murdoch, federal minister of labor to preside at the board of arbitration, was unable to set the exact date for the initial sitting of the conciliators, Frank McKenna, representing the men, and F. P. McGuigan for the company.

He was endeavoring to get in touch with the latter, who has returned to Toronto from North Bay, where he has been acting in a similar capacity. Should no attempt be made, however, to settle the difficulties in the meanwhile, the board will meet without a doubt early next week.

TOWN PLANNER SUGGESTS TAX

Ottawa, May 13.—At the annual convention of the Town Planning Institute of Canada, J. P. Haynes, Toronto, was elected president.

Some aspects of the financial side of town planning were touched upon by Dr. Adam Shortt, who also outlined a method of taxation, by which cities would derive benefit from land hoarding. The process whereby shack towns and slum areas sprang up just outside of the city limits would go on eternally if cities did not make provision for taking in sufficiently large areas while the land was still farm land.
