## LETHBRIDGE FOR DEFENCE

Middlesex Member Demands  
Appointment of Minister  
of Power.

TORONTO, Feb. 28.—Criticism of the Drury government by Hon. George S. Henry, Conservative, of York East, particularly directed at the good roads policy and a defense of the administration by John G. Lethbridge, of Middlesex West, who argued for a minister of power, featured the continuation of the debate on the reply to the speech from the throne in the Legislature this afternoon.

Mr. Henry also claimed that the Liberal leader, Wellington Hay, had suggested in speeches that he was ready to co-operate with the Farmer-Labor government in the province since the Liberal government in Ottawa was in need of Progressive support there.

Dr. Forbes Godfrey read an article published in the Toronto Telegram, which attacked Premier E. C. Drury and Attorney-General W. E. Raney for not attending court to give evidence in the Backus vs. Telegram libel suit, to which they were subpoenaed.

The ministers had written to the litigants that it would be impossible to attend during the session owing to the pressure of government business. Dr. Godfrey asked if it were the intention of the premier to summon the editor before the bar of the house because of the statements contained in the article, to which the premier replied that he did not think the bar of the house was a proper place to try that type of journalism.

Attorney-General Raney, in reply to R. R. Hall, Parry Sound, said his information was that the report that the Shevlin-Clark Company was to close down its mill as a result of the heavy judgment obtained against the company in an action brought by the attorney-general's department was not founded on facts. ## Assaults Census Act.

R. R. Hall took exception to the census act that not only made no provision for listing a person as a Canadian, but also left out the Welsh race—"the cornerstone on which the empire was built and rests and will rest forever."

Hon. Beniah Bowman announced that carloads of hay were being sent to the relief of settlers in New Ontario where cattle were reported to be dying for lack of feed.

In continuing the debate on the reply, Mr. Henry remarked that the Liberal leader, Wellington Hay, had in his recent speech said it made very little difference under what name the Liberal-Conservative group was known, it had almost passed out of existence, anyhow.

"If that is so, then God help Ontario," asserted Mr. Henry. He went on to say that the Liberal leader had on different occasions held out the olive branch to the Drury government, and had expressed the opinion that, with the Liberal government in Ottawa needing the support of the Liberals in the Ontario Legislature should be ready to lend assistance to the Farmer-Labor government.

The Liberal leader, he claimed, was ready to barter his right, his privilege and his duty as an opposition leader to criticize the Ontario government in order that his friends in the federal house might have a more secure hold on the situation there.

Denies Decadence.

Mr. Henry took up at some length the agricultural situation, maintaining that the farming industry in this province was not so decadent as previous speakers had argued. He commended the minister of agriculture on his efforts to start co-operation among the fruit growers, and promised any assistance he might be able to give should the minister start a movement to get the federal government to build a storage elevator in this province.

In connection with highway construction Mr. Henry said the present government had spent already almost \$25,000,000 on roads, and yet less than 1 per cent of the roads of the province had permanent roadways. The program for this year called for an expenditure of \$25,000,000 more.

He questioned the advisability of grants to township roads, because it encouraged the municipalities to "jump in and get all they can get while the getting is good." He thought there should be a highway commission, taking issue with the statement of Hon. Mr. Biggs that the road construction at present was outside of politics. He wished to emphasize that he was one of the most enthusiastic supporters of good roads. Mr. Henry claimed that the present rate of expenditures could not be kept up.

## Lauds Road Policy.

Mr. Lethbridge, who followed, said the energetic good roads policy of the government was the best thing for the farmers that had ever been introduced. He complimented the government for extending the grants to provincial highways and explained that in a recent convention of farmers in his county there was not a man opposed to the system.

While he said he did not wish to appear a pessimist, Mr. Lethbridge claimed that the farmers had a difficult struggle to earn a living, quoting statistics to support this contention.

With regard to the union of the Liberal group with the government, the member for Middlesex said that the tenor of the speeches since this session opened would rather indicate that the groups sitting on the opposition side were united to discredit the government by launching half-truths against it. While some of the speeches may have contained some honest criticisms the majority of them bristled with unjust and unfair attacks against the administration.

## Cites Whitney Plan.

He said the Premier Whitney in 1911 had gone to the country with a platform which included the appointment of a minister of power. For some reason this had never been put into effect. He believed now, as Premier Whitney believed then, that the only proper solution of the hydro question was to put it under a minister responsible to Parliament. To say that hydro must be kept outside politics was an insult to the house. It might as well be argued that the schools should be taken out of politics or the public works.

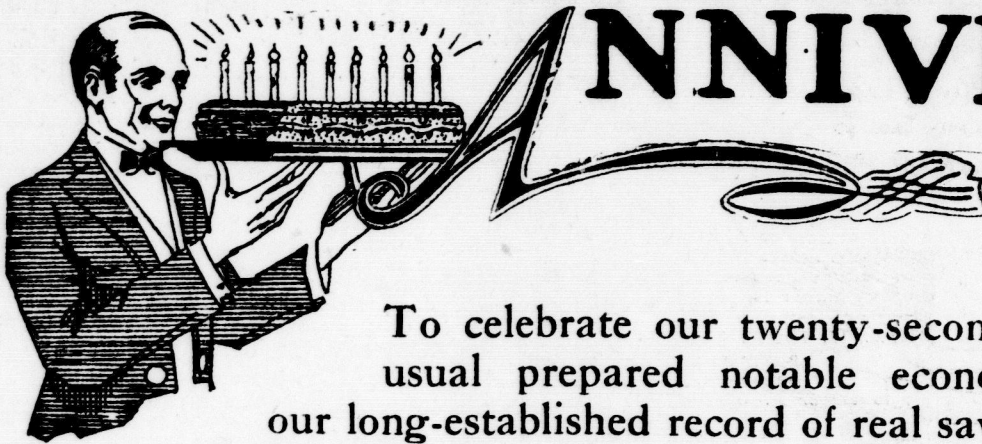
"We see," he said, "that the hydro commission bought a fleet of trucks. They were bought in Sir Adam Beck's own city of London. I have no objection to that; but the members of this house do not know how many a fleet is, or how much was paid for them. The expenditures of the hydro commission should come under the examination of the public accounts committee, like those of the public works department."
