DEFEND ACTS OF ONTARIO'S GOVERNMENT

Doherty and Raney Give Account of Their Stewardships.

SPEAK AT THAMESVILLE

Special To The Advertiser.

Thamesville, Nov. 9.—The local Opera House was crowded to the doors tonight when Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, and representative of East Kent, and Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney-general, addressed the electors on the stewardship of their departments in the Provincial Legislature. Christopher Gardiner acted as chairman.

Hon. Mr. Raney answered criticisms against his department, chiefly by Hon. Howard Ferguson and Herbert Lennox. He gave a lengthy address, explaining the expenditures of the government on hydro, education, roads and other works. He told of great amounts received from succession dues, race track licenses, and of the percentages from race gambling. He claimed that the government members all loved horses and racing, but they were not gamblers, maintaining that racing and gambling should have no relationship to the heavy taxes from professional race tracks.

The attorney-general also dealt with the timber limit deals, the pulpwood contracts and other government acts.

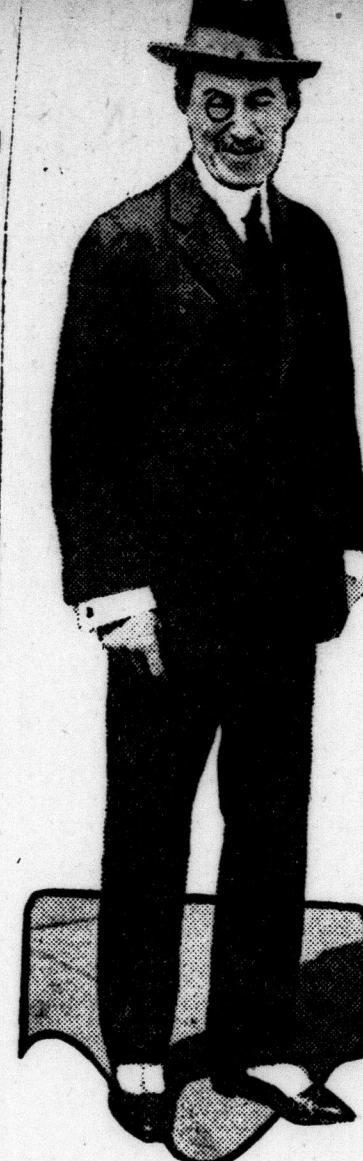
Doherty Replies to Critics.

Hon. Manning Doherty replied to his critics of his actions on the cattle embargo question. He referred to the difficult times when the government assumed the reins of power, and referred briefly to the timber limit deals of the late government, and wanted the people to beware of the propaganda that would be issued during the next few months, immediately before the coming elections, which would surely be sent out by the opposition. To the charge of extravagant spending of money he declared that not one dollar had been expended by the present government that had not been voted on by the government.

Regarding the criticism of the road policy, he maintained that in the past many millions of dollars have been spent on canals and wharves, through which hardly a rowboat has gone through, and yet, when a few millions is spent on roads, great criticism is given.

Mr. Doherty declared that he had remained silent in the face of most unfair and dishonest criticism regarding his activities on the lifting of the embargo against Canadian cattle. He traced the activities of the various governments during the past 30 years, when the embargo was on, and outlined the campaign, in which Lord Beaverbrook had assisted him, and which finally was successful. He claimed that former federal government members had tried to head off the lifting of the embargo, saying that if it was lifted the U. P. O. would be sure to gain control of the government. At the election, which were occupying the attention of the people of the Dominion, Mr. Doherty referred briefly to the rural credit system, co-operative selling of farm products, the establishment of the experimental farm in Kent County, and the grading of swine.

DEWART RESENTS CROWN'S CENSURE

Toronto, Nov. 9.—A brisk flurry started the police court today. While Crown Attorney Eric Armour, K.C., was questioning a witness in an O. T. case, J. W. Dewart, M. L. A., for the defence, commented audibly on his methods.

"It amuses me," said Mr. Armour, turning towards Mr. Dewart, "to hear the two legislators engaged in the passing of the Ontario act making fun of my efforts to enforce it."

Mr. Dewart sprang to his feet. "That remark is entirely uncalled for," he exclaimed. "Mr. Armour knows that, because I'm not in favor of the act. His remark shows his utter unfitness for the position he occupies."

"I'm sorry," said Mr. Armour after a minute or two of silence.

C. N. R. BRAKEMAN KILLED IN REAR-END COLLISION

Winnipeg, Nov. 9.—A brakeman was killed and his body burned beyond recognition in a rear-end collision on the Canadian National Railway near Wainwright, Nov. 8, 1922. The train was hit when it was stalled by a broken air-hose coupling. The caboose and three freight cars were burned.

SUSPECTS IN HALL-MILLS MURDER RETAIN FREEDOM

New Brunswick, N. J., Nov. 9.—Further delay in arresting the alleged slayers of the Rev. Edward W. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills developed today. After a conference of prosecutors and detectives at Somerville today, Special Prosecutor Mott stated that no decision had been reached as to when the grand jury would meet to hear the evidence, but that it would not meet this week and there would be no arrests this week.

ASKS BRANTFORD TO LEND SUPPORT

London Requests Assistance in Correcting Faults of Town Planning Act.

Brantford, Nov. 9.—Brantford has been asked by the City of London to join in supporting the town planning and housing association, in getting amendments enacted by the Provincial Legislature to the town planning act. The amendments suggested by the London Town Planning Commission includes clauses to allow the city council to have more jurisdiction on the commissions and suggests that the commission consist of seven members, including the mayor and three aldermen.

It also suggests that the commission be obliged to tender estimates of its proposed expenditures for the year, on or before March 1, in order that the council may consider any changes necessary, and that the town planning rate should not exceed 1-10 mill on the dollar.

City Clerk Leonard is in receipt of an account through the Grand Trunk Railway for \$225 for the purchase of the old Colborne street station. It is expected that this will come before the council at the next meeting for payment.

Chief Donnelly has declared war on all motorists who do not obey the by-laws compelling drivers of motor vehicles not to exceed 6 miles per hour while crossing Lorne bridge. The chief maintains that all those who are found crossing the bridge at a greater rate of speed than 6 miles per hour, will be hailed before the magistrate.

The Brantford Pet Stock and Poultry Association are making final preparations for the coming poultry show, which, it is expected, will be held in the local armories in the next month or so. According to officials there will be at least 3,000 entries from all parts of the continent. Many of last year's exhibits came from as far south as Kentucky, and as far east as St. John's, Newfoundland, and also among those shown were many Chinese exhibits. In all there were over 2,100 exhibits.

Edward Campbell, president of the local association, won the cup at the poultry show at Hamilton, at which was held the exhibition of Anconas.

CHURCHILL ISSUES REPLY TO CURZON

Declares British Cabinet Minister Was Well Aware of Appeal To Dominion.

London, Nov. 9.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—Winston Churchill has issued a sharp reply to Lord Curzon's remarks yesterday concerning the issue of the appeal to the dominions on September 16 to send contingents in the event of trouble with Turkey, without his knowledge.

"If Lord Curzon had been at his post he would have been consulted," says Mr. Churchill. "It certainly does not lie in the mouth of the minister of foreign affairs, in his post at a most critical juncture, on grounds other than ill-health, to throw blame upon his chief and his colleagues for the urgent action which it was thought necessary to take in the public interest."

Mr. Churchill further asserts that Lord Curzon attended and took part in all the decisions at a cabinet meeting where it was actually decided to appeal to the dominions.

Mr. Churchill also has a sharp dig at Curzon for his "sudden and nimble change of attitude" during the recent political crisis, and says he turned in a most surprising manner upon those with whom he had been loyally through all the long months of his ill-health.

ASQUITH SCORES TORY PRINCIPLES

LONDON, Nov. 9.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—Speaking at Newcastle today, H. H. Asquith, leader of the Independent Liberals, said the Tories had convictions and principles of their own, but in the pinch and stress of emergency they were always found ready to surrender them. When it came to the final grip of the Tories always gave way and, with good or bad grace, capitulated to Liberalism.

Mr. Asquith declared that if the electors returned a Tory majority next week they might find the representative chamber fettered, hampered and controlled or even circumvented by a non-representative second chamber whose powers they had reason to fear.

The country would be credulous to a degree, said Mr. Asquith, if it did not demand something more specific than Bonar Law's soothing words regarding the parliament act. The premier had not abandoned the idea of drift reform, as the safeguarding of industries act was capable without further legislation of extending in almost every direction the impoverishing policy of protection.
