Doherty Replies to Critics. Hon. Manning Doherty replied to his critics of his actions on the cattle embargo question. He referred to the difficult times when the government assumed the reins of power, and to obligations of inexperience. He re-ferred briefly to the timber limit deals of the late government, and wanted the people to beware of the propaganda that would be issued during the next few months, immedbefore the coming elections, which would surely be sent out b the opposition. To the charge of extravagant spending of money he declared that not one dollar has been expended by the present government that has not been voted on by the government.

Regarding the criticism of the road policy, he maintained that in the past many millions of dollars have been spent on canals and wharves, through which hardly a rowboat has gone through, and yet, when a few millions is spent on roads, great criti-
