First Church in Yarmouth

Hardy Pioneers Came Miles Over Blazed Trails To Worship In Original Tiny Log Structure.

St. James' Church, Yarmouth, was at first known as Kilmartin Church; prior to 1830 the part of Yarmouth township north of the Talbot road was unbroken wilderness. In that year one section was taken up by the Edgewood road. Near a boatload of immigrants arrived at Port Stanley, some of whom settled in this North Yarmouth section. Others soon followed, and in a few years the township was almost fully occupied by these hardy settlers. Most of them were from the parish of Kilmartin in Scotland, hence the name Kilmartin church.

These early settlers had to face hardships and privations, but they were men and women of faith and courage, and the privations had to give way before them. They were devout and sincere in their religious professions. Soon they felt the need of a place of public worship, and in 1837 or 38 a log house was erected near the site of the present church.

Blazed Trails.
Many of the people came for miles through the woods with only a blazed trail to guide them, that they might worship God together in their humble meeting place.

At this time St. Thomas was a place of great business. A congregation is said to have been organized there about the time of the 1837 rebellion, but the exact date is quite uncertain. Rev. Donald McLean, mentioned as the first minister, and he had oversight of Yarmouth and Southwold along with his village of Kilmartin. He was a native of Scotland to assist him with his scattered flock.

The first elders in Yarmouth were Duncan Campbell, Hugh McKinnon, McGregor, Hugh Douglas and John McBane. According to Dr. Gregg's history Mr. McKinnon's pastorate was a very brief one, he came from Gwillimbury to St. Thomas in 1840, but difficulties having arisen between him and the congregation the pastoral tie was dissolved by the Presbytery of Hamilton in 1842. Our record tells us that he was succeeded by Rev. D. McKenna, but no date is given, nothing is said about his work, and he must have had only a brief term.

Induct Rev. J. Fraser.
Rev. John Fraser was the next minister, he came to St. Thomas, probably in 1847 or 1848. Before this time, and also for the next ten or twelve years, there long intervals when no minister was in Yarmouth supply. But in 1841 Mr. Duncan McCall had been sent to Canada as an ordained Catechist to give aid in mission work. He settled in Westminster Township, and for many years rendered valuable service, both as pulpit supply and in the oversight of the Presbyterians in Yarmouth, Southwold and Dorchester Townships, with frequent supply over a wider district. Mr. Clark of London also did much faithful work among the early settlers.

Mr. Fraser carried on the work in Yarmouth, and in 1850 Kilmartin congregation was organized. There is no mention of communion there until some four years later. The names of communicants were probably on the St. Thomas roll and they went there to attend service. The first recorded meeting of session in the log church was in 1851. This was followed by similar meetings from time to time in the church or in the homes, and Mr. Fraser continued to hold frequent services in the church until 1856, when Yarmouth was separated from the church and united with Dorchester (now Belmont) congregation.

United With Belmont.
This year (1856) seemed to have marked a new stage in the life of the congregation. First, there was the union with Belmont early in the year. Next, regular communion supply was given for the first time during the summer months. Mr. Archibald McDiarmid preaching to each of the congregations on alternate Sabbaths in both Gaelic and English. Then in September the first communion in their own church was observed. Rev. Duncan McMillan of Albro, by appointment of the presbytery, taking charge of the services, receiving a considerable number of members into full communion, and baptizing many children.

One report also assigns to this year the replacing of the old log church by a new frame edifice. This, however, is doubtful. The Belmont church was built that year, and other items in the report referred to would indicate a later date for the building of Kilmartin church. In 1858 a joint meeting of session was held. Rev. A. Young of St. Thomas presiding, when it was decided to ask presbytery for removal of the church to be held in Kilmartin church. The request was granted.
