SUSPENDED OVER A GULCH

Narrow Escape From Death of Passengers on Northern Railway Train.

Particulars of the accident which occurred on the Northern Railway on September 10th to passenger train No. 2, while on her way from White Horse to Skagway.

The train was suspended over a gulch of the tunnel on the White Pass, about two miles north of Skagway. That no lives were lost appears to be due to the quick action of Engineer McKenzie.

Everything ran smoothly to the summit and the heavy train started on the down grade.

The train was entered and the engine, two baggage cars and four coaches had safely passed over the high trestle just west of the tunnel when the forward trucks of the last coach jumped the track.

The read trucks stayed on the track, which was most miraculous.

By this time every member of the train was on hand, and the passengers were being taken to safety by the men of the train.

Lying in State

State Services Held For Dead President of the United States.

Many People Injured in Crush to See Remains at the Capitol.

Washington, Sept. 17.—Today was the occasion on which the nation was to pay its last tribute of respect and admiration at the bier of the dead President.

Other nations had ordered their diplomatic and military representatives to be present.

At 8 o'clock a silent command was given and the body-bearers raised the casket to their shoulders.

At 10:30 the cortege reached the Capitol, and the casket containing President McKinley's remains was borne into the rotunda of the Capitol, where funeral services were held.
