Cost of Feeding Fowl.  
During my address at Carleton Place, Ont., under the auspices of the North Lanark Farmers' Institute, I stated that a hen could readily be kept upon a farm at a cost of seventy-five cents a year. Someone in the audience questioned this. At the close of my remarks, Mr. Joseph Yuill, of Carleton Place, the well-known Ayrshire breeder, addressed the meeting for a few minutes, and assured the audience that there was money in poultry. He gave his method of feeding seventy hens, and the cost of same, which is as follows:

Two and a half pounds oat clover hay which is steamed before feeding, at \$8 per ton ..... 1 0  
Three pounds shorts, which is mixed with clover hay, at \$16 per ton ..... 2 0  
(The above is fed the first thing in the morning.)

Five pounds roots, fed at ten o'clock ..... 1 0  
Five pounds ensilage (corn and leaves only), fed at noon ..... 2 0  
Five pounds oats, fed at night, at 30c per bush 4c, meat scraps 4c ..... 4 0

Cost of feeding seventy hens for 1 day. 11c  
Cost of feeding seventy hens for 365 days, 11c x 365 = \$40.15.  
Cost of feeding one hen for 365 days, \$40.15 ÷ 70 = 57 2/7c.

You will thus see that Mr. Yuill feeds his hens, based on winter cost, for 57 2/7c each per year. He stated that, taking the year round, he did not think the cost would be more than 50c.

### Teach the Common Things.

A multitude of hungry souls are running hither and thither and asking how to cook, how to eat, how to sleep, how to breathe, how to ventilate houses, how to keep warm, how to prevent contagion, how to clothe themselves, how to anticipate storm or heat, how to treat diseases, how to obey natural laws, and many other "hows" on kindred subjects. The teacher who prepares himself to give talks on these subjects will find a beckoning hand toward the school district enabled to pay the highest salary. In giving these little talks, as well as presenting any subject interestingly, relegate all books to the shelves. The old method of teaching was the teacher, the book, the pulpit, or in other words the book between the teacher and the pupil—a barrier which separates the spark of interest; but the new and correct method is the book, the teacher, and the pulpit. Books should serve merely as a guide, an outline, in the search for knowledge, as things of reference and not the residuum of all truth. That prince among teachers, Guyot, said long ago, "the pupils will not need to be instructed in the words of the book, but should be sent out to observe for themselves, and then questioned by the teacher as to what he was utterly ignorant of the subject." This is particularly true of all studies based on natural science.

The common things around about everywhere afford the keys to the interest, attention, and consequent development of all the different subjects; and the teacher who is an adept in serving this mental food has nearly solved the knotty problem of a correct system of education.
