Ontario Department of Agriculture

Lambton County farmers adopt scientific farming. The campaign of the local branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, Petrolia, conducted this Spring for the treatment of seed oats for smut was responded to readily by the farmers. By the reports from the druggists throughout the County to the District Representative there has been an increase of 300% in the sale of formalin in the County this spring, over last spring's sales. This means that 57,000 bushels of seed oats have been treated for smut this spring; or enough seed to sow 23,000 acres. This number of acres is only a little better than one-third of the total acreage of oats grown in the county each year. The ravages of Loose Smut of oats have been increasing each year until last year reports show that it lowered the yield of oats from 10% to 15% per acre. This increase in the use of formalin on the seed oats will add very materially to the value of the oat crop this season. It will demonstrate to the farmers within the County to their own satisfaction that Loose Smut of oats can be successfully combatted, increasing the yield of grain, making threshings cleaner, leaving the barn cleaner and the straw brighter and more palatable to the stock.

The Department is calling attention of the farmers to prepare to protect their potato crop against Late Blight and Rot. The disease is carried over from season to season as mycelium in or on the tubers. There is very little evidence that their spores can live over in the soil. The conditions favoring the disease are: 1st, humidity during July and August; second, relatively low temperatures from 65 to 70 degrees, cool damp nights and muggy days; third, excessive moisture in soils, especially clay land. To prevent this disease developing the

potatoes should be sprayed when about six inches high with Bordeaux Mixture, made from 4 lbs. of Bluestone, 4 lbs. of unslacked Lime and 40 gals. of water, spraying every ten days or two weeks. This treatment, if fully carried out, will combat the disease and increase the yield of potatoes over and above a normal yield. Further information and directions as to the use of Bordeaux Mixture can be had by writing the District Representative, W. P. Macdonald, Petrolia, Ont.

East Lambton Women's Institute

The president's report included a summary of the reports of the different branches showing great activity in Red Cross and patriotic work in different lines, as well as the usual Institute work. No Occasion to Worry

Owing to the Rainfall

The continued wet weather has caused some apprehension about crops in Ontario and Quebec; but Hon. Martin Burrell thinks there is no reason to worry. In these two provinces grass is the most valuable crop, grass for pasture and grass for hay. It is the crop that is mainly responsible for the big dairy output, and to a considerable extent for beef.

The abnormal rainfall has not affected the growth of grass, which promises to be a record. With the present high

prices for butter, and cheese, beef and hay, grass is really the controlling factor. In a mixed farming district, Mr. Burrell points out, abundance of rain is preferable to too little.

In the west where wheat is the outstanding crop, departmental officers report good growing conditions, while there are also exceptionally fine prospects in the Maritime Provinces.
