—The salad dressing most commonly used in this country, and the one easiest of ite kind to make, is known simply as cooked salad dressing, and is made as follows: To each yolk of egg use one tablespoonful of vinegar. Heat the vinegar to the boiling point, sitr in the well beaten yolks of the eggs and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Season highly with salt, pepper and mustard. This may be put away in earthenware or glass and kept in a cool place for a long time. When ready to use, thin with cream or rich milk until it is about the consistency of custard, and use like any other salad dressing.
