INTRODUCTION.

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The late remarkable expedition of Colonel Doniphan through the Mexican country has been narrated with considerable detail in the New Orleans National newspaper, and from it, been extensively copied and circulated by the press of the United States. Though most of the facts are highly exciting and interesting, yet there is one among them that will survive the remembrance of the others, and be more likely to perpetuate the memory of that arduous undertaking than even the object for which it was despatched. About the time Colonel Doniphan made his treaty with the Navajos, a division, of his command was entirely out of provisions, but these were liberally supplied with the present necessities, by the
