Ontario Crops.

Ottawa, July 13.—The director of the experimental farms has returned from a journey to the Maritime Pro-vinces and Quebec. He has also gone over a large part of Western Ontario. The following is taken from his notes on the crops:

Fall wheat in Western Ontario ripening very irregularly. In many fields there are large patches nearly ripe, enough to cut, while other parts of the same field are quite green. A portion of the area in fall wheat is patchy, and uneven from winter killing, and it is not likely, from present appearances, that this important crop will average more than fifteen bushels to the acre. The Hessian fly is proving troublesome in some parts. of the country. Spring wheat in Ontario looks healthy, and is heading nicely and promises a fair return, but owing to dry weather early in the season, the straw is unusually short.

Rules of the Road.

(3) In case a person travelling or he ing upon a street or highway upon a bleycle or tricycle is overtaken by any vehicle as aforesaid, or horseman travelling at a greaten speed, the person so overtaken shall quietly turn out to the right and allow the said vehicle or horseman to pass, and the person so overtaking the bleycle or tricycle shall turn out to the left so far as may be necessary to avoid a collision.

(4) In case a person travelling apon a highway on a bleycle or a tricycle overtakes any vehicle as aforesaid or horseman travelling at a less speed, or a person travelling at a less speed, or a person travelling on foot, the person travelling on the bicycle or the tricycle shall give the other person adible warning of his approach before attempting to pass, and shall pass to the left of such vehicle or horseman, who shall if practicable turn to the right to allow such bleycle or tricycle sufficient room to pass on the travelled roads on bleycles or tricycles meet each shall turn to the right.

(5) In case two persons travelling on on bleycles or tricycles meet each shall turn to the right.

(6) In case a person travelling on a bicycle overtakes another travelling on on a breycle the one overtaken shall keep or turn to the right of the travelled way to allow the other to jess on the left.

(7) Persons travelling upon hierels shall keep to their right of the middle line of the travelled roadway.

(8) Persons travelling upon devele, and turning at street intersections from one street to another shall if uming to the right keep close to the corner of the street intersection; if uming to the left they shall first ross the intersecting street and then turn so at to keep to the right of the readway.
