PRESENTATIONS TO FATHER FOX.

Who Left on Friday Evening for Rat Portage, Ont.

A delegation from the St. Joseph and Catholic Truth Society, consisting of Messrs. A. McGillis, president, T. M. Woodford, A. Lucier, T. Coyle, and F. W. Russell, met last evening in the parlors of St. Mary's presbytery, for the purpose of presenting a formal address to Father Fox on the occasion of his departure from the city.

The St. Joseph and Catholic Truth Society, having incidentally heard that you are about to leave St. Mary's parish, could not let the opportunity pass without giving expression to its regret and sorrow that so precious and devoted a pastor should be removed to another portion of the Lord's vineyard. During the year's stay you have labored in our midst with your divine and your human wisdom and charity, and by your zeal in the service of your Divine and your human duties, you have won the respect and admiration of all who have had the advantage of your spiritual guidance.

Our increasing knowledge of your expanding virtues served to intensify our love for you, and that makes the separation and physical distance did not correspondingly diminish your unceasing efforts to make your spiritual children excel in virtue and piety, and we pray that you may yet be spared for many years to continue the good work in which your life has been devoted, and we beg you to accept of the accompanying badge.

Father Fox replied in most tender and touching terms to the kind feelings which could prompt so generous an expression of love and esteem from the members of the Catholic Truth society. He said that of the many regrets which would accompany him, there was not one more deeply felt than that of his severing his connection from the Catholic Truth Society of Winnipeg. He thanked the society for the great kindness manifested to him.

Last Friday evening there assembled at the C. P. R. station a number of Winnipeg's most prominent Catholics, for the purpose of presenting a farewell address and a purse of gold to Father Fox, on the occasion of his departure to Rat Portage. Father Fox, on entering the waiting room, was surrounded by those who were in waiting. Mr. D. Smith proceeded at once to read the formal address, expressive of the sentiments of his friends.

At the conclusion, Mr. Smith presented Father Fox with a purse of gold, as a token of the esteem and respect of the parishioners of St. Mary's. This was almost too much for the venerable and saintly priest, who could do no more than express to those present and to his many other friends the heartfelt feelings of gratitude which he entertained towards them, and to assure them that he would never be unmindful of them in his prayers.
