New SOFTWARE FOR TRADE STAFF

Key trade tools are now much faster and easier to use

The Trade Information Systems Division (TPP) is currently improving the Department's key trade software tools including WIN Exports, Trade Activity Management System (TAMS), Program for Export Market Development (PEMD) and Trade and Investment Promotion Planning System (TIPPS).

These re-engineered trade systems

are designed in Windows and fully compatible with SIGNET. The trade user will find these improved software tools much faster and easier to use.

For example, company information found in the new versions of TAMS, PEMD and TIPPS is integrated into the WIN Exports database. This means trade staff can view an exporter's full history with TAMS and PEMD, their involvement in Department-sponsored trade shows and missions and their visits to posts within the WIN Exports database. In the end, trade staff can monitor a Canadian exporter's total involvement with the Department's trade program.

These improved software tools are deployed in headquarters this spring and summer. The post versions of WIN Exports and TAMS will be made available during this autumn. TIPPS, which will be completely redeveloped, will be deployed in 1995.

WIN Exports on CD ROM will now be published twice a year - July and January. The July version of WIN

profiles published by Industry Canada.

The Market Intelligence Message System (MIMS) pilot in Atlanta and Los Angeles was successful. TPP is currently working with SIGNET to integrate the MIMS concept into the ICONDesk Messaging System for delivery by the end of this year. With the MIMS functionality, trade staff will be able to send multi-addressed faxes locally and/or to Canada from their workstations using SIGNET's IconDesk Messaging System.
