REGIONAL INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION

MATANE PAPER MILL PROJECT—GOVERNMENT POSITION

Mr. Jean-Claude Malépart (Montreal—Sainte-Marie): Mr. Speaker, in the absence of the Minister of Regional Industrial Expansion, I would like to ascertain whether another Minister on the other side is looking after the interests of Quebecers. Hon. Members would know that answers are not forthcoming with respect to equalization payments and potatoes.

Concerning the Matane paper mill project, about which the Minister of Regional Industrial Expansion made a commitment to his Quebec counterpart, I should like to know if a Minister might have an explanation for the fact that, in a prepared statement he read yesterday, the Parliamentary Secretary said: "Before making any decision about such projects, we would have to take into consideration the possible impact our assistance might have on the current trade negotiations with the Americans." Is there any connection between the delay in granting financial assistance to the Matane paper mill and the free trade negotiations with the Americans, as implied in the statement?
