Canada-U.S. Free Trade Agreement

(Mr. Malépart). He said: "The Liberals would tell Canadians we won't negotiate one deal with the U.S. but several deals with other countries. We won't put all your eggs in one basket. Eventually Mr. Turner will make public a series of principles of accord on which any Liberal free trade deals could be based".

This is the Malépart version. He said: "This thing wasn't dreamed up overnight and dropped on the caucus just like that, said Mr. Malépart, the MP for Montreal—Sainte-Marie. It was worked out after a lot of thought. We relied heavily on findings of various public opinion polls".

That is the policy, apparently, but it changes every couple of days. Then we have John Ferguson from Southam News on June 14 who did an analysis of the Hon. Member for Winnipeg—Fort Garry's pronouncement, and I highly recommend everyone in the House read this. He says: "But if Canada isn't going to take on the U.S., where else are we going to peddle our wares? Well, it is all laid out in a new trade policy of the Liberals released Wednesday".

We are going to conquer the world, that is what the Liberals are going to do. It says: "The Liberals think we will get clobbered in any head-on competition with the Americans under free trade but we're going to knock them dead in a Pacific Rim, bowl them over in Europe, and have them begging for mercy in Latin America". All we have to do is follow these simple steps. These are the simple Axworthy steps: "Shake up the bureaucracy again to recreate the old department of industry and trade".

You know, the ones the Liberals uncreated in 1982 to move all the trade people over to the Department of External Affairs. That was a jim-dandy. That is going to revolutionize the world. Yes, Sir, we are going to be able to knock them dead in the Pacific Rim when we do that, bowl them over in Europe and have them begging for mercy in Latin America. Funny, in 1982 they told us that making trade part of External would "result in a greater priority in trade objectives, in the conduct of our international relations, give greater emphasis to the international marketing of resources and services, and strengthen Canada's ability to adapt to change in world economic conditions". Has there ever been such a travesty of a trade policy put forward by anyone in any form in such a shape that is so laughable and so ludicrous if it was not so dangerous?

Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Crosbie: The Liberals hope to improve especially the GATT dispute settlement mechanism, and so do we. We started the process two years ago. In mid-December we will be having the mid-term meeting of the 95 GATT countries in Montreal trying to achieve those objectives, having done two years of work getting ready for it. We both have the same objectives there.

We have taken a lead role in the working group which is now seeking to improve the dispute settlement under GATT. Peter Bentley, Chairman of Canfor in B.C., pointed out:

We have no assurance about when the current Uruguay round of GATT will be completed.

Remember that. No assurance on when it will be completed. It could take years. He says:
