My dear Sir Arthur:

Dr. and Mrs. Zoltan Magyary of Budapest are visiting the United States at the present time. They are planning to be in Montreal on Friday and Saturday, December 9th and 10th, and I have taken the liberty of giving them a letter of introduction to you.
