HOLIDAY TRAFFIC IS HEAVY ALREADY

New Record is Expected by Officials at Union Station.

That a new record for Thanksgiving Day traffic in and out of Toronto will undoubtedly be established this year, the weather clears up, is the opinion of railroad men, who have handled the crowds for years, and who are in position to judge. All day yesterday, especially in the afternoon and evening, almost continuous lines of incoming and outgoing passengers filled the platform at the gates at the Union Station. Said one gatekeeper, "I have never seen so many people for several years. The Thanksgiving Day traffic is always very heavy, but considering the fact that this is the first year since 1914 that it is so heavy as it is this year." The same conditions prevailed at Parkdale, West Toronto and other suburban stations all day.

Practically all of the evening trains were late arriving at the Union, some of them coming in as much as an hour and a half behind their scheduled time. These delays were invariably caused by the handling of so many passengers.

FLANNAGAN'S DEATH

DUE TO OWN ACT

Fell Down Stairs While Intoxicated and Trespassing in Private House.

"We find that John Flannagan came to his death by falling down the stairs while trespassing on the property of Herbert Matthews, 163 Simcoe street, and 'exonerate Matthews from any blame,' was the verdict rendered last evening by the jury enquiring into the death of John Flannagan, who died as the result of breaking his neck when he fell down the stairs at 163 Simcoe street while intoxicated.

The evidence showed that Flannagan had crawled through a cellar window, gone upstairs, undressed and then fell down the stairs, which was unprotected. The absence of a banister was explained by Joseph DeCourcy, who stated that two weeks ago Flannagan had fallen down the same stairs, taking with him the banister, the absence of which ultimately resulted in his death.

TEACHERS CLOSE

BIG CONVENTION

J. L. Leary Was Elected President by a Unanimous Vote.

DEFINING EDUCATION

Chief Inspector Cowley Says

Technical Side Needs

More Money.

It was a great gathering of Toronto teachers, nearly two thousand in all, who assembled in convocation hall yesterday morning for the closing day of their convention. A good deal of time was passed in discussing circumstances arising out of an incident of last year, in reply to Mr. Fraser, a communique from the executive was read, approving the regulation of the education department of Ontario, providing that the teachers of public and separate schools should unite in institute work for the purpose of continuing the training of teachers, and requesting deeply that a speaker at one meeting had made remarks naturally offensive to separate school teachers. Mr. Fraser did not approve the action of the executive in the matter.

In moving the adoption of the auditor's report, a plea was put in for a fund of \$10,000 for the establishment of a clubroom for teachers.

Representing the Ontario Teachers' Alliance, L. E. Embrase urged upon the association to support the association he represented. To make the alliance a success, adequate membership was essential. He pointed out that the personal interests were looked after by the alliance, which in this way differed from other organizations of teachers. It also publishes a year book, "Schools and Teachers." The gathering was asked not to neglect their correspondence with the executive.

The position of industrial and technical education was presented by William Stevenson, representing the Trades and Labor Council. The subject, he said, was the greatest question of the day, and is being discussed by all branches of labor organizations. Miss Carruthers revived the agitation for the restoration of the chair of pedagogy at the University.

The election of officers resulted in J. L. Leary being raised to the presidency of the association by acclamation. Miss Addie Burger received the unanimous vote for the vice-presidency. The suggestion to disjoin the offices of secretary and treasurer was referred to the executive. The following nominations for the officers were made: Mr. Wallace, Winchester school, Etobicoke; W. L. Almerston, and Miss Knowles, Ryerson.

The closing session of the convention, held in Convocation Hall yesterday afternoon, was one of the most interesting of the congress. An appreciation for the organ recital of Ernest McMillan was voted by the hearty applause of the present teachers' institute.

Miss Jessie McGregor, in the course of her address as president, suggested that the teaching body be divided into a number of teachers' institutes, the territory of which might be confined to the different inspectorates. At the time of congress, she suggested that the teachers' institutes might be arranged to take the place of numbers now on the program. In making this suggestion her idea was not to do away with the present Teachers' Association, which would still continue to disburse the funds it has in charge. She hoped that rooms might be secured for the use of the teachers when the board of education had its own department in the city hall.

Miss McGregor also referred to the work of the secretary, which while very heavy for one, might be light if undertaken by five or six. This would help to preserve that most precious of a teacher's possessions, her vital energy.

Test's "Good Bye" and "My Dream" were sung by Miss Janet Cringan and were much enjoyed.

Mr. Hiltz's Paper.
One of the most interesting addresses of the convention was given by W. W. Hiltz, chairman of the board of education. Mr. Hiltz spoke on the relationship of education to citizenship. After tracing the course of education among the earlier nations, the speaker stated that the ideal method is to train youth that he may be of use first to himself and then to his country.

When the assertion was made that it was the duty of the board of education to employ the very best teachers available and to give them corresponding remuneration, Mr. Hiltz was rewarded with the applause of his audience. Personality was emphasized as the greatest asset of the teacher and character-building as the thing that should be the aim of the schools.

George Branton, a pupil of Essex academy, sang an operatic selection and "The Last Rose of Summer" with a voice and technique so beyond the ordinary that they fairly surprised his hearers. He was applauded to the echo, and Mr. Fraser moved a vote of thanks to the youthful vocalist.

The probability of technical education receiving the support of the federal government was the chief note in an address by the chief inspector, R. H. Cowley.

Education Defined.

WILL MAKE REPORT

AT WASHINGTON

Ontario's Health Officer to

Be Present at International

Waterways Commission.

Dr. J. W. S. McCullough, chief officer of health for Ontario, leaves this week for Washington to present the provincial report on the sewage investigation of border waters. A conference between American and Canadian experts has been arranged, and the work accomplished by both during the year will be combined for presentation to the commission on international waters.

Dr. McCullough is not prepared to disclose the results of the examination, but will make recommendations of certain sewage disposal methods which are now in use.

Big Areas Polluted.

It is understood that the extent of sewage pollution in the current areas of lake and river municipalities is very large in some cases and extends a long distance from the shore. The substance of the American report is taken to show even greater evidence of this condition in the case of many large manufacturing centres facing the border.

The most likely action to follow will be a concerted move on the part of both countries in the adoption of uniform measures. This would be necessitated because of the intermingling of the excreta from the cities of both.

One of the special subjects of investigation was to discover to what extent American sewage would affect Canadian waters in such narrow streams as the St. Clair and Detroit rivers.

MUST NOT TAKE

ANY MORE SAND

Harbor Board Granted an In-

junction Against Sand

and Supplies, Limited.

Judge Middleton yesterday afternoon gave judgment in the action of the Toronto Harbor Commissioners against the Royal Canadian Yacht Club and the Sand and Supplies, Limited, in an action brought by the commissioners to restrain the defendants from removing the sand to recover damages for sand removed from the property given by the City of Toronto to the Yacht Club. His honor decided that the club had exceeded the privileges given in the lease and that they had no power to remove the sand. An injunction was granted to the commissioners to restrain the defendants from taking any more sand, and the plaintiffs were also awarded damages for costs. The action for forfeiture of the lease was dismissed.

The case arose over the conduct of the Yacht Club in connection with the water in the harbor. The club had leased the sand and supplies, limited, to remove the sand for practically nothing, while the company was making immense profits. The excavation of the sand was destroying the beach at the island, and otherwise injuring the water course to such an extent that the harbor commissioners took the case to court.

VETERAN DOORKEEPER DEAD

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—(Can. Press.)—

John Chilton, doorkeeper of the Canadian parliament, died last night, at the advanced age of 81 years. Deceased held the position of doorkeeper since 1876, and has seen seven Canadian premiers and ministers since that date came to power. He was with Sir John A. Macdonald when the latter's death occurred in 1891.
