If Capt. Clerke had advanced fo far in his paffage North-about from Kampfchatka, as to have cleared Nova Zembla to the Westward, he must, barring accidents, have arrived in England by the end of November at the lateft. There is a poffibility, however, nay a probability, that his ships may have received damage in the ice, by being to late in the year in the Northern Ocean : and, in this cafe, he may be put into Lapland to repair; and may be compelled to winter there, or in fome other Northern parts, from whence no intelligence can be received. Let us hope, that he and his brave crew are in fafety fomewhere; and that, if it is their fate to winter in the icy regions, they have found means to build themfelves a house, as Barentz and his brave crew did 183 years ago.—Upon the whole, I am of opinion, that, if Capt. Clerke continued in his feeming refolution of proceeding
