The Petition of the General Congress, held at Philadelphia in November last.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN!

W E your Majesty's faithful subjects of the colonies of North America, &c. in behalf of ourselves and the inhabitents of those colonies, who have deputed us to represent them in general congress by this our humble petition beg leave to lay our grievances before the throne.

A ftanding army has been kept in these colonies ever fince the conclusion of the late war, without the consent of our affemblies; and this army, with a confiderable naval armament has been employed to enforce the collection of taxes.

The authority of the commander in chief, and under him of the brigadier general, has in time of peace been rendered fupreme in all the civil governments in America.

The commander in chief of all your Majefty's forces in North America, has in time of peace, been appointed governor of a colony. The charges of usual offices have been greatly encreased, and new expensive and opprefive offices have been multiplied.
