CHICAGO, Oct. 5.-Heavier receipts Reject northwest had a bearish effect to-day on wheat. The end of the day left the market depressed, varying from 1-8c to to 518e down, oats off 1-8c to 3-8c and provisions trading from unchanged figures to 12 1-2c below.

Prospectors Are Searching for Precious Stones in Hudson Bay Region—Expected - Back Soon.
