Late John L. Sullivan's Yarns Were Often Quoted and Repeated

When John L. was in England and boxed before the Prince of Wales, later King Edward, the prince was so impressed with the American fighter that he sent him a gold-headed cane. A mild, meek-mannered gentleman in waiting delivered the present to Sullivan at his hotel.

John L. opened the box, and when he saw what it was he threw it back at the prince's messenger and roared at him as he hastily retreated from the room.

"Take this back to his nob's and tell him I'm no cripple!"

Sullivan had a great admirer in Chicago in an Irishman named Colonel Thomas Jefferson Dolan. When Dolan was fighting Corbett at New Orleans a large crowd gathered in a Chicago armory and heard the return over a private wire. Dolan's witty remarks on that day formed the basis of one of the first Irish dialect stories written by Finley P. Dunne (Mr. Dooley). Lou Houseman, who was a theatrical man, was at the time in New Orleans, and was at the Dolan fight.

Houseman flashed: "Sullivan! he knocked out in the twenty-first round."

Colored Dolan yelled out, "On whose authority?"

"On the authority of the Western Union and Lou Houseman," was the answer of Finley Carroll, the announcer for the fight.

"They're both d— liars!" yelled Dolan.

If there was anything that John L. hated more than anything else, it was cigarette. A few years ago Billy Birch, a fellow looking Chicago reporter, went to Sullivan and asked him to let him have a cigarette hanging from his lips. John L. let out a roar which shook the building.

The only interview that Birch got was this: "Young man, you're a sap. Don't you know that cigarette smoking will take 20 years of your life? That's the reason I don't smoke. I've got a few years more of my life to live, and I don't want to waste it on a bunch of smoke."

Of course all this conversation was privately decorated with expressions which would make a pirate blush.

One day Sullivan went up to Bridgeport to see Terry McGovern, who was then at Cap Bond's training camp at Stratford. It was a cold, wintry day, and Sullivan hired a sleigh in Bridgeport and started to drive to Stratford, a few miles away from the sleigh. Sullivan held the reins and was dragged by the sleigh along the street for some distance until he finally landed in a snow bank.

When the spectators came running up to see him, he said: "Why didn't you let me go to —" yelled John L. "I never let go."

John L. had a fund of slang expressions, many of which are heard even today. It was Sullivan who first used "To the woods with ya" when he wanted to get rid of anybody. His slang was rough but timely.

Sullivan's honest mistakes in his speeches were widely quoted throughout the country.

One time in a speech in Washington, Sullivan said: "The greatest guy this country ever produced was Daniel Webster, the guy who wrote the dictionary."

Most of the yarns about the famous Boston gladiator have grown in the telling, and there are many versions about his first meeting with the Prince of Wales. Sullivan's version is the one that is most widely repeated.

Before Sullivan married a second time he had many treacherous things against the marriage game. Some of his pearls of wisdom on marriage were:

"The trouble with marriage is this: Lots of people get married that ain't wanted. Then it's a scrap for life. Longed for, and a fight to a finish. It takes all your life."

"That's the fellow the poetry guys call Cupid has knocked out. He's a real man. And he's only a bantamweight at 125 pounds."

"When Sullivan knocked out Paddy Ryan for the American title, Ryan was so badly punished at the end that a ship from Sullivan's open hand knocked him out and won the title for the Boston strong boy."

WAS CLOSELY GUARDED.

London, Ont., Feb. 28.—George Morelo, confessed burglar, gunman and jail-breaker, was taken to Kingston Penitentiary this evening. He was closely guarded and every precaution was taken to prevent his again escaping. Morelo broke jail here recently and after being caught a few days ago at Kitchener, was sentenced to serve seven years.
