Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

Land Regulations. The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the com-mencement of the present war, and has since continued to be, a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominión Land in Manitopa, Saskatohewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Do-minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry oy proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties-Six months' residence upon and cuitvation of iand in each of three years. In certain districts a nouesteader may

of land in each of three years. In certain districts a nonesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption, trice \$3.00-per acre, Duties -Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extra, May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as home-stead patent on certain conditions.

biead patent on certain conditions.
A settler, after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purenased nomestead in certain districts. Frice \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a nouse worth \$300.00.
Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.
When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who nave served overseas and have been honorably discharged, freceive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (out not Sub-Agency). Agent.
