56 LOADS AT JUNCTION TRADE DRINK, PRICES UP

Advance of 25 to 35 Cents on Cattle—Everything Sold Before 9 a.m.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards were 56 car loads, composed of 1140 cattle 32 sheep, 40 calves and 2 horses.

The quality of fat cattle was generally good, both butchers and exporters. Trade was brisk, the best of the season thus far, prices for both butchers and exporters of all classes being from 25c to 35c per cwt. higher than last Monday.

Exporters.—Prices ranged from \$4.85 to \$5.50 per cwt., with a little more for one choice load, at \$5.75 to \$5.25 per cwt. Export bulls sold at \$3.75 to \$4.50 per cwt. more exporters would have sold readily.

Butchers.—There was not much of good to choice butchers' cattle offered, being so scarce that many of the local butchers could not get any prices for packed lots ranging from \$4.85 to \$5.15 and one or two lots of \$5.75 to \$5.25 per cwt. Loads of good sold readily at \$4.85 to \$5 per cwt. Medium, \$4.50 to \$4.75; common, at \$4.25 to \$4.50; cows, at \$3.25 to \$4.25 per cwt.

Feeders.—There were a few lots of short-beef feeders brought in, but as exporters were scarce only half fat were brought up for export purposes. Short-beef feeders, 1100 lbs. each, at \$3.25 per cwt. Good quality would be worth from \$4.50 to \$5 per cwt.

A few milkers and springers sold at \$30 to \$50 each. Veal Calves.—Prices ranged from \$2.50 to \$3.50 per cwt. for inferior to common; \$3.50 to \$5 per cwt. for medium; at \$5.50 to \$6.25 and \$6.50 for good to choice.

Export ewes sold at \$3 to \$5.25 per cwt.; bucks, at \$3.75 to \$4.25; choice yearling ewes, at \$4.75 to \$7 per cwt.; 2-year-old yearling lambs, at \$6.50 to \$7 per cwt.; spring lambs, \$5.50 to \$7 per cwt.
