Country remittances are coming forward fairly well, while city collections are quiet. Wools hold quiet and firm, and there has been a heavy increase in the arrivals of hides here. Prices hold firm. Receipts of leather are increasing, and there is a good export demand for light and medium grades. Money is in good demand both for call and time.
