**DEED IN COOK INQUEST**

**Dr. Glendenning Made Admissions, But Evidence Did Not Confirm Charges.**

Markham, Sept. 29.—(Special.)—Interest in the case of the death of Mrs. Cook of Highland Creek, the adjourned inquest of which was opened before Coroner Wesley Robinson this morning, has been greatly intensified by the statement of William Cook, husband of the deceased, who gave evidence which caused Crown Attorney Drayton to despatch a special messenger to Malvern, a distance of six miles, to secure the doctor who attended the woman. The jury was empaneled on Wednesday with T. B. Reive as foreman, and after viewing the body of the mother and child, which were disinterred at Locust Hill Cemetery, adjourned until this morning.

Dr. Glendenning testified that Mrs. Cook came to his office on June 8 and complained of being unwell. He described the treatment which she had asked for and had been given.

To Mr. Drayton witness stated that he intended to deceive her. He treated Mrs. Cook, who accompanied Mrs. Cook, for poisoned ivy. On Friday, July 27, next he saw Mrs. Cook at her home in response to a telephone message and visited here again on July 29, and at different intervals. He detailed the calling in of Dr. G. S. Sibley, of Agincourt, and the necessity of an operation.

To Mr. Drayton witness admitted that he knew the effect of large doses of quinine. He advised the burial of the child in the yard of the Cook house.

He also admitted that he was not a regularly qualified physician, and had not passed the council examinations for diseases of women, physiology and medicine.

Dr. Sibley testified as to the birth of the child, which was still born. He attributed death to shock and collapse rather than to blood poisoning.

Dr. Silvester, of Toronto, and Dr. Macdonald of Markham conducted a post-mortem examination. Owing to the advanced decomposition, nothing definite could be ascertained. Death might be due to septaemia (blood poisoning).

County Constable Burns brought Dr. Glendenning's books but nothing was revealed in them.

Fred Cook, the woman's husband, in his evidence said that he had told him an operation had been performed, and that if she recovered she would never do anything like that again. She had told him an instrument had been used and that she felt as if she had been cut to pieces inside.

To the jury Coroner Robinson said: "I have only to express regret that the practice of abortion so common here, when the mother is in a state of alarmingly prevalent in Canada. Realizing that this is an evil with which every medical man has to contend, I have been approached by you, not scores, but hundreds of times, by women prominent in church work on just such missions as that with which the accused is charged."

He warned the jury that the evidence given by Cook was wholly uncorroborated and would be accepted in any court other than a coroner's court. The statement regarding an operation, which Cook alleged was made to him by his wife, was not an ante-mortem statement, and was made by the latter before her illness became serious.

The jury retired and after being out an hour returned the following verdict: "That the said Mrs. Cook came to her death at Highland Creek, Ontario, about the seventh day of September from natural causes following a premature confinement, and we believe that she did not receive proper nursing during her illness."
