THE PROCTOR MEMORIAL.

Largest Astronomical Observatory Will Have Largest Telescope.

Chicago, April 15.—A. H. Isham of San Francisco, second vice-president of the World's Proctor Memorial Association, is on his way to Belfast, Ireland, to confer with Mrs. Proctor, widow of the astronomer, Richard A. Proctor, in the interest of the great project of erecting the largest astronomical observatory in the world on the summit of Mount San Miguel, near San Diego, Cal.

The observatory is to be fitted out with the largest telescopes that have ever been constructed and they are two in number.

The first is to have a lense five times the size of that of the Lick and four times the size of the ferks.

Ever since the death of the great astronomer, Sir Richard A. Proctor, Mrs. Proctor has been desirous of founding a memorial in his honor. In seeking a site for the proposed memorial, she went to California, and her desire met a response in A. H. Isham, who owned the peak of Mount San Miguel. Mr. Isham donated this to the great memorial. The big telescope is for this memorial.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.

Montreal, April 16.—Receipts of cattle at the markets this morning were only moderate, while small meats were in heavier supply. Only a fairly active inquiry continues to rule, and business is confined almost exclusively to the meeting of local requirements, there being practically nothing doing on export account. At the Eastern abattoir market about 350 head of cattle, 300 sheep and lambs and 800 calves came in. Prices were quotably the same as on Monday, and a fair demand was shown both for cattle and small meats. The range to-day was from 2½c to 4c for common inferior animals to best butchers' beeves. Calves brought from \$1 to \$8 each, according to size and quality. Spring lambs, were selling at from \$2 to \$4 for common to good quality. Prices realized on sheep were \$3.50 to \$4. Following was the general range of quotations: Cattle—Butchers', choice, per lb., 3½c to 4c live weight; db., medium to fair do., 3c to 3½c per lb., live weight; culls, do., 2c to 2½c. Calves—Good to choice, \$7 to \$10; common to good, \$2 to \$4. Sheep—Common to good, \$3.50 to \$4.50.



Henry A. King & Co., 12 King-street east, received the following despatch to-day from Chicago:

The wheat market had a firm start on the better tone-to the cables and the bad advices from Ohio, where it is said the crop would not exceed 15,000,000 bushels, against 32,000,000 bushels last year. There were also some bad reports from Missouri and Indiana, and some damage by bugs from Sputhern Illinois. There was a noticeable lack of outside buying and good selling for the southwest, which, combined with reports from there of improved crop prospects, caused prices to decline to 65½c. We do not expect to see New York stocks decrease over 250,000 bushels this week. It is reasonable to expect good growing weather now, and the chances are that there will be at least some improvement in the growing crop conditions. Northwest continues to send in complaints of the bedward condition of seeding, and it begins to look as if it would be impossible to put in a full average acreage.

Corn and oats firm, with slight change in quotations. The movement is phenomenally small, but within a week navigation should permit the saining of corn now loaded in Chicago to the amount of 6,000,000 bushels, which we anticipate will have a beneficial effect on the market, practically all the visible supply being there at the present time. We can see no signs of increased movement for some time yet. We look for improved values, and some action to the market.
