Cooleran, chief of detectives, concerning the Anarchists arrested last night, said: "I found upon examining them that they have been in China, Switzerland, France, England, Germany, Bohemia and Russia: They claim they are more radical than Parsons and Spies were. They believe in no bailot box, but in government by groups and comrades."
