A court of appeal will also be held on Friday, May 10, when Judge McDougall will decide the validity of the claims of those who find it impossible to convince the registrars of their right to register. Twenty-five registration booths are to be established in localities as determined by Judge McDougall within the next few days.

RAILWAY BONUSES.

Ald. Urquhart protested against the delay on someone's part in answering his questions regarding what railways are aided by the City of Toronto in the way of bonus or otherwise, with full particulars. He expressed his great surprise that such tardiness should occur that it should take two or three weeks to get information which he could get himself in two or three hours if he had access to the documents. He was promised that City Treasurer Coady would have the information ready for him at the next meeting of the Council.

Urquhart by Mr. Coady during the afternoon in the shape of a statement of sundry grants made to railway companies by the City of Toronto, which totalled \$1,433,717.84, as follows: Northern Railway, \$1,000, now operated by G.T.R., \$240,000; 1853, Grand Trunk Railway, now operated by G.T.R., \$1,000,000; 1870, Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway, now operated by C.P.R., \$274,907.31; 1874, Toronto and Nipissing Railway, now operated by G.T.R., \$1,111,112.18; 1875, Ontario and Quebec Railway, now operated by G.T.R., \$940,903.33; 1875, Ontario and Quebec Railway, now operated by G.T.R., \$940,903.33.
