NOMINATIONS IN HAMILTON

With Four Candidates in the West and Three in the East the Fight is on.

SOCIALIST ASPIRANT IS IN JAIL

Views Aired by the Others—Personalities Play a Big Part.

Hamilton, May 22.—The fight is on in earnest here, with four candidates in West Hamilton and three in East Hamilton. The nominations for West Hamilton were held in Association Hall, and for East in the Court House. (These were the nominations:—

East Hamilton—Henry Carscallen, K.C., Conservative, nominated by J. M. Robinson, seconded by Wm. Bell, Herbert S. Griffin, M.D., Liberal, nominated by Seneca Jones, seconded by Francis Maxwell, Lockhart M. Gordon, Socialist, nominated by William Barrett, seconded by Robert Burns, West Hamilton—S. F. Washington, Liberal, nominated by John Knox, seconded by E. Skedden, John S. Hendrie, Conservative, nominated by J. V. Lamoreaux, seconded by George L. Staunton, E. A. Colquhoun, Independent Conservative, nominated by J. P. Macleod, seconded by John Harrison, Robert Roadhouse, Socialist, nominated by A. McKenzie, seconded by Herbert Burns.

At the East Hamilton nominations both Mr. Carscallen and Dr. Griffin balked at considerable length. Mr. Carscallen condemned the Liberal candidate for retaining the position of assessor commissioner after he had accepted the nomination. Dr. Griffin replied that by the terms of the license Act he was not a commissioner on accepting the nomination. He added that he had already sent in his resignation, which had been accepted.

The Socialist candidate being in jail could not publicly air his views. Both meetings were not largely attended, and there was lacking the enthusiasm which has marked former gatherings of this nature.

At the West Hamilton nomination the party candidates made the customary speeches. Mr. Colquhoun declared that he would stand to the last, and if returned would support Mr. Whitney. He claimed the Tory party had had its knife out for him for two years.

GLOBE GARBLED IT.

Editor World: The report on the prospects of the election reproduced from The Sun by The Globe, you will observe, is a news item, not an expression of the opinion of any one connected with The Sun. If I personally have expressed any opinion on the subject, it has been in a general way, and to the effect that an occasional change of the party in power was probably essential to the integrity and efficiency of our system of parliamentary government. The leaders of a party which has been long out of power are of necessity untried as administrators. But I see no reason for doubting that in both of our parties there is practical ability which the test of office would bring out. The Globe has naturally taken the part of The Sun's article, which is most favorable to its friends. Navigation Notes. With fine weather to-morrow, the steamboat men expect to do a big business. It will be the opening of the excursion season in Toronto, the day on which Torontonians will take their first trip on the water. The Chicora will run to Niagara, leaving Toronto at 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. The Macassa and Modjeska will both be on the Hamilton route, and will leave here at 7.30 and 11 a.m., 2.15 and 9.30 p.m. The Lakeside will make three trips to St. Catharines, leaving here at 8 a.m. and 2 and 10 p.m., and the Argyle will leave at 7.30 a.m. for Oshawa, and at 2 p.m. for Whitby, Oshawa and Bowmanville. The White Star will make two trips to Oakville, leaving at 9.15 a.m. and 2 p.m. The Perry Company will have a full service to the Point, where there will be special attractions. The "Clark Bros' People's Ferry" will make about 20 trips from the foot of Church street to Island Park. Most of the steamboat companies are offering special reduced rates for the day, and are going on Friday, returning up till 10 p.m.

demonstrated wherein the school boys monopoly was wronged, extracting money from the pockets of ratepayers. Mayor Daville of Aurora gave a rousing address, and as evidence of Mr. Lennox's popularity quoted the fact that at a recent election in the Council Room that town only nine votes were recorded against "The boy candidate."

An Exciting Scene. On Mr. Lennox rising to address the audience, the band played "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" and a scene of the wildest enthusiasm took place. Hats were thrown in the air, handkerchiefs waved and 2500 lusty voices yelled themselves hoarse. The candidate was visibly affected by the warmth of his reception, and expressed himself unable to properly return his thanks. Mr. Lennox spoke for two hours, and was listened to with the closest attention. Notwithstanding the fact that he has addressed meetings nightly during the past two or three weeks his voice was clear and strong, and he created a profound impression. He favored the passing of an act reducing the cost of traveling on the roads from 3 to 2 cents per mile, and drew ringing cheers from the agriculturalists. He also favored the transportation matter and the necessity for redress. The Commissioner of Crown Lands was also mentioned by reason of his failure to keep faith with the temperance element, and his refusal to favor the granting of a license to the Ontario Hotel.

Mr. Lennox, who occupied a seat on the platform, shared with her husband in the honors of the day. Judged by the applause everywhere, it is evident that North York will be redeemed on May 29.

MOVES AND RICHARDSON

Only Two Candidates in the Field in East York.

Markham, May 22.—The formality of nominations for East York was gone thru here this afternoon. The town hall was packed, and the various portions of the riding were well represented. The political opinion of the meeting was nearly evenly divided, with the advantages to the Conservatives. The speeches lasted for nearly four hours, and all of the speakers were given a hearty hearing. There were three nominations—John Richardson, J. W. St. John, and W. J. Hill. Mr. Richardson, a Toronto lawyer, who has figured more or less during the campaign as a prohibitionist. The last mentioned, after speaking for half an hour, withdrew. Both of the candidates who remained were given a hearty hearing, and Richardson had his candidature championed by S. C. Biggs and J. D. Allan of Toronto, while Mr. Moyes fought his battle alone.

WESTON

Weston, May 22.—The nomination of candidates to represent the riding of Weston in the provincial legislature took place in Eagle Hall this afternoon. At 2 o'clock, P. Ellis, returning officer, announced the following candidates: John Wesley St. John, nominated and seconded by Geo. Syme of York Township; Andrew Kersey of Vaughan, and William James Hill nominated and seconded by Wm. Parsons and Peter Devine. Mr. St. John, J. H. Thompson, and W. J. Hill were the only candidates who were given a fair hearing and there were few interruptions.

LIGHTNING KILLS TWO.

Within 30 Days Fenelon Falls Parents Lose Four.

Fenelon Falls, May 22.—During a thunderstorm which passed over this village about 6.30 this evening little Jennie and Jamie Smith, aged about 14 and 10 years respectively, children of Mr. Thomas Smith of this place, were killed. The girl was going out to a neighbor's for milk, and when she was about 100 yards behind her, when lightning struck and killed both instantly within three yards of the door. Mr. Smith and family have the heartfelt sympathy of the whole community, and the more so because of their having buried two other young children on the 4th of this month.

FOR COLONIAL PREMIERS.

Extensive Plans for Their Entertainment Being Arranged.

London, May 22.—The colonial Premiers will be the guests of the Earl of Harrowby at Sandown Hall, Staffordshire, towards the end of their provincial tour. They will commence their journey round the provinces on June 16, and will visit Leeds, Liverpool, Manchester, Birmingham, Glasgow and Edinburgh, where they will be feasted, shown over manufactures and called upon to speak about their colonies. They will be entertained at a banquet, probably at the Guildhall, at which Mr. Chamberlain has promised to preside, and at which cabinet ministers and ex-cabinet ministers will be present to do them honor. They will also be invited to a colonial ball in London, to a trip up the river with a call at Taplow Court as the guests of Mr. W. H. Grenfell, and to the principal London theatres, with special attention on the stages after the performances.
