All Railways Under Jurisdiction of Thanksgiving Day Advartage of Canada.

Ottawa, Oct. 18.—(Special.)—The house took a couple of hours to-day to deal with the senate amendments to the Railway Commission bill. There were seventy of these in all. The house between the Minister of Justice and the leaders in the senate to endeavor to reach an understanding on the dozen amendments of the senate in which the house refused to concur. The first amendment rejected was

that which placed railways with provincial charter under Dominion jurisvincial charter under Dominion juris diction only as regards their crossings with other roads, and as to their thru business. The commons held that the amendment, besidese being practically unworkable, is of doubtful legality. All rallways under the jurisdiction of the commission, the commons insists, shall be declared to be works for the general advantage of Canada.

The amendment which declares a member of the commission shall forfeit his seat on the board for accepting a gift from a railway, directly or in-

Clarke when a motion of the Minister of Justice to reject the senate amendment in regard to cattle guards being in the interest entirely of the railways, was carried. The reason given for its rejection was that the amendment does not remedy the evil existing under the present law.

The 46th amendment was rejected on the ground that parliament cannot limit the amount in regard to which an application be taken.
