Gentlemen of the Council: I feel sure that every member of the Council regrets the revelations which have come to light during the past few weeks. in connection with the taking of the vote at the recent municipal elections. When the ballot system was introduced in election contests, it was fett that a fair and honorable method had been adopted under which a voter could, free from all outside influence or intimidation, express his opinion on public questions by voting for the man of his choice. But the result has been that astute and dishonest men have destroyed the sanctity of the bullot, and have introduced into elections fearing methods which had no place in the old system of open voting.

# WILL EVERYTHING BE TIED UP?

The entire criminal prosecution machinery set in motion against those accused of responsibility for the election frauds will stop to-day if the writ of prohibition invoked by counsel for Samuel Thompson is issued. Crown Attorney Curry said last night to The World that he had no hope of bringing anyone to justice if this writ was issued.
